#### **Expansion Slots**

The system board is equipped with I AGP slot, 3 PCI slots (I shared with CNR slot) and I CNR slot.

AGP is an interface designed to support high performance 3D graphics cards. It utilizes a dedicated pipeline to access system memory for texturing, z-buffering and alpha blending. The universal AGP slot supports AGP 2x with up to 533MB/sec. bandwidth and AGP 4x with up to 1066MB/sec. bandwidth for 3D graphics applications. AGP in this system board will deliver faster and better graphics to your PC.

CNR (Communication and Networking Riser) is an interface that can support multi-channel audio and V.90 analog modem.

#### IrDA Interface

The system board is equipped with an IrDA connector for wireless connectivity between your computer and peripheral devices. It supports peripheral devices that meet the IrDA or ASKIR standard.

#### **USB** Ports

The system board supports 6 USB ports. Two onboard USB ports are located at the ATX double deck ports of the board. The J25 and J26 connectors on the system board allow you to connect 4 more optional USB ports. These optional USB ports, which are mounted on a card-edge bracket, will be provided as an option. USB allows data exchange between your computer and a wide range of simultaneously accessible external Plug and Play peripherals.

#### Desktop Management Interface (DMI)

The system board comes with a DMI 2.0 built into the BIOS. The DMI utility in the BIOS automatically records various information about your system configuration and stores these information in the DMI pool, which is a part of the system board's Plug and Play BIOS. DMI, along with the appropriately networked software, is designed to make inventory, maintenance and troubleshooting of computer systems easier. Refer to chapter 4 for instructions on using the DMI utility.

## Introduction

#### 1.1.2 System Health Monitor Functions

The system board is capable of monitoring the following "system health" conditions.

- Monitors CPU/system temperature and overheat alarm
- Monitors CPU/3.3V/±5V/±12V/VBAT/5VSB voltages and failure alarm
- Monitors CPU/system fan speed and failure alarm
- Automatic system fan on/off control
- Read back capability that displays temperature, voltage and fan speed

Refer to the "PC Health Status" section in chapter 3 and the "Hardware Monitor" section in chapter 4 for more information.

#### 1.1.3 Intelligence

#### **CPU** Temperature Protection

The CPU Temperature Protection function has the capability of monitoring the CPU's temperature during system boot-up. Once it has detected that the CPU's temperature exceeded the CPU temperature limit defined in the BIOS, the system will automatically power-off after 5 warning beeps. Refer to "CPU Temp. Prot. Function and CPU Temp. Prot. Alarm" in the PC Health Status section in chapter 3 for more information.

#### Automatic System Fan Off

The system fan will automatically turn off once the system enters the Suspend mode.

#### **Dual Function Power Button**

Depending on the setting in the "Soft-Off By PWRBTN" field of the Power Management Setup, this switch will allow the system to enter the Soft-Off or Suspend mode.

#### Wake-On-Ring

Introduction

This feature allows the system that is in the Suspend mode or Soft Power Off mode to wake-up/power-on to respond to calls coming through an internal or external modem. Refer to "Wake-On-Ring Connector" in chapter 2 and "Ring Power Up Control" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.

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#### Important:

If you are using a modem add-in card, the 5VSB power source of your power supply must support  $\geq$ 720mA.

#### Wake-On-LAN

The Wake-On-LAN function allows the network to remotely wake up a Soft Power Down (Soft-Off) PC. Your LAN card must support the remote wakeup function. Refer to "Wake-On-LAN Connector" in chapter 2 and "Ring Power Up Control" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.



#### Important:

The 5VSB power source of your power supply must support  $\geq$ 720mA.

#### Wake-On-PS/2 Keyboard/Mouse

This function allows you to use the PS/2 keyboard or PS;/2 mouse to wake up a system from the S3/S4/S5 state. Refer to "Jumper Settings for Wake-On-PS/2 Keyboard/Mouse" in chapter 2; and "PS2 Mouse Power Up Control" and "KB Power On Password" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.



#### Important:

- If you forgot the password, you must power-off the system, unplug the power cord and clear the CMOS data. Follow the steps in the "Jumper Settings for Clearing CMOS Data" section in chapter 2.
- The 5VSB power source of your power supply must support ≥720mA.

#### Wake-On-USB Keyboard

The Wake-On-USB Keyboard function allows you to use a USB keyboard to wake up a system from the S3/S4/S5 state. Refer to "Jumper Settings for Wake-On-USB Keyboard" in chapter 2 and "USB Port Wake Up Control" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.



#### Important:

- If you are using the Wake-On-USB Keyboard function for 2 USB ports, the 5VSB power source of your power supply must support ≥1.5A.
- If you are using the Wake-On-USB Keyboard function for 4 to 6 USB ports, the 5VSB power source of your power supply must support ≥2A.

#### RTC Timer to Power-on the System

The RTC installed on the system board allows your system to automatically power-on on the set date and time. Refer to and "Power Up By Alarm" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.

#### ACPI STR

The system board is designed to meet the ACPI (Advanced Configuration and Power Interface) specification. ACPI has energy saving features that enables PCs to implement Power Management and Plug-and-Play with operating systems that support OS Direct Power Management. Currently, only Windows<sup>®</sup> 98/2000/ME/XP supports the ACPI function. ACPI when enabled in the Power Management Setup will allow you to use the Suspend to RAM function.

With the Suspend to RAM function enabled, you can power-off the system at once by pressing the power button or selecting "Standby" when you shut down Windows<sup>®</sup> 98/2000/ME/XP without having to go through the sometimes tiresome process of closing files, applications and operating system. This is because the system is capable of storing all programs and data files during the entire operating session into RAM (Random Access Memory) when it powers-off. The operating session will resume exactly where you left

off the next time you power-on the system. Refer to "Using the Suspend to RAM Function" in appendix A for more information.

#### <u>Important:</u>

The 5VSB power source of your power supply must support  $\geq$ 1A.

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#### AC Power Failure Recovery

When power returns after an AC power failure, you may choose to either power-on the system manually, let the system power-on automatically or return to the state where you left off before power failure occurs. Refer to "PWR Lost Resume State" in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.

#### Virus Protection

Most viruses today destroy data stored in hard drives. The system board is designed to protect the boot sector and partition table of your hard disk drive.




NS30-SC (Uses SiS<sup>®</sup> 645/961 chipset)



#### <u>Warning:</u>

Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can damage your system board, processor, disk drives, add-in boards, and other components. Perform the upgrade instruction procedures described at an ESD workstation only. If such a station is not available, you can provide some ESD protection by wearing an antistatic wrist strap and attaching it to a metal part of the system chassis. If a wrist strap is unavailable, establish and maintain contact with the system chassis throughout any procedures requiring ESD protection.

## 2.2 System Memory




The system board is equipped with two 184-pin DDR SDRAM DIMM (Dual In-line Memory Module) sockets that support 2.5V DDR SDRAM DIMM. Double Data Rate SDRAM (DDR SDRAM) is a type of SDRAM that doubles the data rate through reading and writing at both the rising and falling edge of each clock. This effectively doubles the speed of operation therefore doubling the speed of data transfer.

Refer to chapter I for the type of memory supported by the system board.


### 2.2.1 Installing the DIM Module

A DIM module simply snaps into a DIMM socket on the system board. Pin I of the DIM module must correspond with Pin I of the socket.



- I. Pull the "tabs" which are at the ends of the socket to the side.
- 2. Position the DIMM above the socket with the "notch" in the module aligned with the "key" on the socket.
- 3. Seat the module vertically into the socket. Make sure it is completely seated. The tabs will hold the DIMM in place.

## 2.3 Jumper Settings for Clearing CMOS Data



#### Clear CMOS Data - Jumper JP5

If you encounter the following,

- a) CMOS data becomes corrupted.
- b) You forgot the keyboard, supervisor or user password.
- c) You are unable to boot-up the computer system because the processor's ratio/clock was incorrectly set in the BIOS.

you can reconfigure the system with the default values stored in the ROM BIOS.

To load the default values stored in the ROM BIOS, please follow the steps below.


- 1. Power-off the system and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Set JP5 pins 1 and 2 to On. Wait for a few seconds and set JP5 back to its default setting, pins 2 and 3 On.

3. Now power-on the system.

If your reason for clearing the CMOS data is due to incorrect setting of the processor's ratio/clock in the BIOS, please proceed to step 4.

- 4. After powering-on the system, press <Del> to enter the main menu of the BIOS.
- 5. Select the Frequency/Voltage Control submenu and press <Enter>.
- Set the "CPU Clock Ratio" or "CPU Host/SDRAM/PCI Clock" field to its default setting or an appropriate frequency ratio or bus clock. Refer to the Frequency/Voltage Control section in chapter 3 for more information.
- 7. Press <Esc> to return to the main menu of the BIOS setup utility. Select "Save & Exit Setup" and press <Enter>.
- 8. Type <Y> and press <Enter>.

## 2.4 Jumper Settings for Wake-On-PS/2 Keyboard/Mouse




#### Wake-On-PS/2 Keyboard/Mouse - Jumper JP1

The Wake-On-PS/2 Keyboard/Mouse function allows you to use the PS/2 keyboard or PS/2 mouse to power-on a system from the S3/ S4/S5 state. By default, JPI is disabled. To use this function, set JPI to 2-3 On. "PS2 Mouse Power Up Control" and "KB Power On Password" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup submenu of the BIOS must be set accordingly. Refer to chapter 3 for details.

#### <u>Warning:</u>

- The power button will not function once a keyboard password has been set in the "KB Power On Password" field. You must type the correct password to power-on the system.
- The 5VSB power source of your power supply must support ≥720mA.

#### Jumper Settings for Wake-On-USB Keyboard 2.5



#### Wake-On-USB Keyboard for USB I and 2 - JP2 Wake-On-USB Keyboard for USB 3 to 6 - JP3

The Wake-On-USB Keyboard function allows you to use a USB keyboard to wake up a system from the S3/S4/S5 state.

By default, this function is disabled. To use this function, JP2 or JP3 pins 2 and 3 must be set to On. "USB Port Wake Up Control" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup submenu of the BIOS must also be enabled.

## Martant:

- If you are using the Wake-On-USB Keyboard function for 2 USB ports, the 5VSB power source of your power supply must support ≥1.5A.
- If you are using the Wake-On-USB Keyboard function for 4 to 6 USB ports, the 5VSB power source of your power supply must support ≥2A.


## 2.6 Ports and Connectors

#### 2.6.1 Serial Ports

Hardware Installation

The built-in serial ports are RS-232C asynchronous communication ports with 16C550A-compatible UARTs that can be used with modems, serial printers, remote display terminals, and other serial devices. You can set the serial ports' I/O address in the Integrated Peripherals submenu ("Onboard Super IO Device" field) of the BIOS.

#### 2.6.1.1 NS35-SC and NS35-SL




#### Connecting the Serial Ports

The NS35-SC and NS35-SL system boards are equipped with an onboard serial port (J4 - Teal/Turquoise) for COM I primary serial port located at the ATX double deck ports of the each board. They are also equipped with a 9-pin connector at location J6 for COM 2 secondary serial port.


One card-edge bracket mounted with a serial port cable is provided with the system board. If you want to use the secondary serial port, connect the serial port cable to connector J6. Make sure the colored stripe on the ribbon cable is aligned with pin 1 of connector J6. Mount the card-edge bracket to the system chassis.

#### 2.6.1.2 NS30-SC and NS30-SL



The NS30-SC and NS30-SL system boards are equipped with onboard serial ports (COM I: J4 and COM 2: CNI) - both in Teal/ Turquoise color located at the ATX double deck ports of the each board.

## 2.6.2 PS/2 Mouse and PS/2 Keyboard Ports



The system board is equipped with an onboard PS/2 mouse (Green) and PS/2 keyboard (Purple) ports - both at location J2 of the ATX double deck ports of the system board. The PS/2 mouse port uses IRQ12. If a mouse is not connected to this port, the system will reserve IRQ12 for other expansion cards.


The Wake-On-PS/2 Keyboard/Mouse function allows you to use the PS/2 keyboard or PS/2 mouse to wake up a system from the S3/ S4/S5 state. Refer to "Jumper Settings for Wake-On-PS/2 Keyboard/ Mouse" in chapter 2; and "PS2 Mouse Power Up Control" and "KB Power On Password" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.



#### Warning:

Make sure to turn off your computer prior to connecting or disconnecting a mouse or keyboard. Failure to do so may damage the system board.

## 2.6.3 Parallel Port




The system board has a standard parallel port (J5 - Burgundy) located at the ATX double deck ports of the board for interfacing your PC to a parallel printer. It supports SPP, ECP and EPP modes. You can set the port's mode in the Integrated Peripherals submenu ("Onboard Super IO Device" field) of the BIOS.

Setting	Function		
SPP (Standard Parallel Port)	Allows normal speed operation but in one direction only.		
ECP (Extended Capabilities Port)	Allows parallel port to operate in bidirectional mode and at a speed faster than the SPP's data transfer rate.

## 2.6.4 Floppy Disk Drive Connector

Hardware Installation




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The system board is equipped with a shrouded floppy disk drive connector that supports two standard floppy disk drives. To prevent improper floppy cable installation, the shrouded floppy disk header has a keying mechanism. The 34-pin connector on the floppy cable can be placed into the header only if pin I of the connector is aligned with pin I of the header. You may enable or disable this function in the Integrated Peripherals submenu ("Onboard Super IO Device" field) of the BIOS.

#### Connecting the Floppy Disk Drive Cable

- Install the 34-pin header connector of the floppy disk drive cable into the shrouded floppy disk header (J22) on the system board. The colored edge of the ribbon should be aligned with pin 1 of J22.
- 2 Install the other 34-pin header connector(s) into the disk drive(s). Align the colored edge of the daisy chained ribbon cable with pin I of the drive edge connector(s). The end-most connector should be attached to the drive you want to designate as Drive A.

#### 2.6.5 IDE Disk Drive Connector



The system board is equipped with two shrouded PCI IDE headers that will interface four Enhanced IDE (Integrated Drive Electronics) disk drives. To prevent improper IDE cable installation, each shrouded PCI IDE header has a keying mechanism. The 40-pin connector on the IDE cable can be placed into the header only if pin I of the connector is aligned with pin I of the header. You may enable or disable the onboard primary or secondary IDE controller in the Integrated Peripherals submenu ("SIS OnChip IDE Device" field) of the BIOS.

#### Connecting the IDE Disk Drive Cable

- If you are connecting two IDE drives, install the 40-pin connector of the IDE cable into the primary shrouded IDE header (connector J18). If you are adding a third or fourth IDE device, install the 40-pin connector of the other IDE cable into the secondary shrouded IDE header (connector J17).
- 2. Install the other 40-pin header connector(s) into the device with the colored edge of the ribbon cable aligned with pin 1 of the drive edge connector(s).



#### <u>Note:</u>

Refer to your disk drive user's manual for information about selecting proper drive switch settings.

## Adding a Second IDE Disk Drive

When using two IDE drives, one must be set as the master and the other as the slave. Follow the instructions provided by the drive manufacturer for setting the jumpers and/or switches on the drives.

Hardware Installation


The system board supports Enhanced IDE or ATA-2, ATA/33, ATA/66 or ATA/100 hard drives. We recommend that you use hard drives from the same manufacturer. In a few cases, drives from two different manufacturers will not function properly when used together. The problem lies in the hard drives, not the system board.



#### Important:

If you encountered problems while using an ATAPI CD-ROM drive that is set in Master mode, please set the CD-ROM drive to Slave mode. Some ATAPI CD-ROMs may not be recognized and cannot be used if incorrectly set in Master mode.

The system board supports 6 USB ports. USB allows data exchange between your computer and a wide range of simultaneously accessible external Plug and Play peripherals. You must have the proper drivers installed in your operating system to use the USB ports. Refer to your operating system's manual or documentation.

Two onboard USB ports (J3 - Black) are located at the ATX double deck ports of the board.

Depending on the type of USB port cable that you are using, the J25 and J26 connectors on the system board allow you to connect 4 more optional USB ports. These optional USB ports, which are mounted on a card-edge bracket, will be provided as an option. If you wish to use the optional USB ports, install the card-edge bracket to the system chassis then insert the connector that is attached to the USB port cables to J25 or J26.

Insert the USB port cable connector to pins 1-10 if:


• One of the holes on the cable connector is plugged, meaning the cable connector has a keying mechanism.

Insert the USB port cable connector to pins 6-15 if:

• None of the holes on the cable connector is plugged, meaning the cable connector has no keying mechanism.


The Wake-On-USB Keyboard function allows you to use a USB keyboard to wake up a system from the S3/S4/S5 state. Refer to "Jumper Settings for Wake-On-USB Keyboard" in chapter 2 and "USB Port Wake Up Control" ("PM Wake Up Events" field) in the Power Management Setup section in chapter 3 for more information.



If your monitor supports analog video but does not have a 15-pin D-shell connector, see your monitor dealer for the adapter or optional cable. After you plug the monitor cable into the VGA port, gently tighten the cable screws to hold the connector in place. Some monitors have a switch that chooses between analog and TTL (or digital) operation. If your monitor has such a switch, set it for analog.


Connect your IrDA cable to connector J20 on the system board. Set "UART2 Mode Select" in the Integrated Peripherals submenu ("Onboard Super IO Device" field) of the BIOS to the type of IrDA standard supported by your device. You must have the proper drivers installed in your operating system to use this connector. Refer to your operating system's manual or documentation.



#### <u>Note:</u>

The sequence of the pin functions on some IrDA cable may be reversed from the pin function defined on the system board. Make sure to connect the cable to the IrDA connector according to their pin functions.







#### **Onboard Audio Jacks**

Lighted LEDs serve as a reminder that you must power-off the system then turn off the power supply's switch or unplug the power cord prior to installing any memory modules or add-in cards.

# 2.6.18 Power Connector



We recommend that you use a power supply that complies with the ATX12V Power Supply Design Guide Version 1.1. Connect the ATX12V power supply's 20-pin ATX main power connector and 4-pin +12V power connector to J8 and ATXP1 respectively.

The 4-pin +12V power connector enables the delivery of more +12VDC current to the processor's Voltage Regulator Module (VRM).

The mainboard requires a minimum of 250 Watt power supply to operate. Your system configuration (amount of memory, add-in cards, peripherals, etc.) may exceed the minimum power requirement. To ensure that adequate power is provided, use a 300 Watt (or greater) power supply.



# 2.6.19 Front Panel Connectors



#### HD-LED: Primary/Secondary IDE LED

This LED will light when the hard drive is being accessed.

#### G-LED: Green LED

This LED will not light when the system's power is on or when the system is in the S3 (STR - Suspend To RAM) state. It will blink every second when the system is in the S1 (POS - Power On Suspend) state.

#### ATX-SW: ATX Power Switch

Depending on the setting in the BIOS setup, this switch is a "dual function power button" that will allow your system to enter the Soft-Off or Suspend mode. Refer to "Soft-Off By PWR-BTTN" in the Power Management Setup (Chapter 3).

#### G-SW: Green Switch

This switch will allow your system to enter the Suspend mode.

#### **RESET: Reset Switch**

This switch allows you to reboot without having to power off the system thus prolonging the life of the power supply or system.

#### SPEAKER: Speaker Connector

This connects to the speaker installed in the system chassis.

#### PWR-LED: Power/Standby LED

When the system's power is on, this LED will light. When the system is in the S1 (POS - Power On Suspend) state, it will blink every second. When the system is in the S3 (STR - Suspend To RAM) state, it will blink every 4 seconds.



Note:

If a system did not boot-up and the Power/Standby LED did not light after it was powered-on, it may indicate that the CPU or memory module was not installed properly. Please make sure they are properly inserted into their corresponding socket.

# 3.1 The Basic Input/Output System

The Basic Input/Output System (BIOS) is a program that takes care of the basic level of communication between the processor and peripherals. In addition, the BIOS also contains codes for various advanced features found in this mainboard. This chapter explains the Setup Utility for the Award BIOS.

After you power up the system, the BIOS message appears on the screen and the memory count begins. After the memory test, the following message will appear on the screen:

Press DEL to enter setup

If the message disappears before you respond, restart the system or press the "Reset" button. You may also restart the system by pressing the <Ctrl> <Alt> and <Del> keys simultaneously.

When you press <Del>, the main menu screen will appear.

#### Date

The date format is <day>, <month>, <date>, <year>. Day displays a day, from Sunday to Saturday. Month displays the month, from January to December. Date displays the date, from 1 to 31. Year displays the year, from 1994 to 2079.

#### Time

The time format is <hour>, <minute>, <second>. The time is based on the 24-hour military-time clock. For example, 1 p.m. is 13:00:00. Hour displays hours from 00 to 23. Minute displays minutes from 00 to 59. Second displays seconds from 00 to 59.

# IDE Primary Master, IDE Primary Slave, IDE Secondary Master and IDE Secondary Slave

Move the cursor to the "IDE Primary Master", "IDE Primary Slave", "IDE Secondary Master" or "IDE Secondary Slave" field, then press <Enter>.

#### **IDE HDD Auto Detection**

Detects the parameters of the drive. The parameters will automatically be shown on the screen.

#### IDE Primary/Secondary Master/Slave

If you wish to define your own drive type manually, select "Manual". The drive type information should be included in the documentation from your hard disk vendor. If you select "Auto", the BIOS will auto-detect the HDD & CD-ROM drive at the POST stage and show the IDE for the HDD & CD-ROM drive. If a hard disk has not been installed, select "None".

#### Capacity

Displays the approximate capacity of the disk drive. Usually the size is slightly greater than the size of a formatted disk given by a disk checking program.

#### Access Mode

For hard drives larger than 528MB, you would typically select the LBA type. Certain operating systems require that you select Normal or Large. Please check your operating system's manual or Help desk on which one to select.

#### Drive A and Drive B

These fields identify the types of floppy disk drives installed.

#### Halt On

This field determines whether the system will stop if an error is detected during power up. The default setting is All Errors.

No Errors The system boot will not stop for any errors detected.

- All Errors The system boot will stop whenever the BIOS detects a non-fatal error.
- All, But Keyboard The system boot will not stop for a keyboard error; it will stop for all other errors.
- All, But Diskette The system boot will not stop for a disk error; it will stop for all other errors.
- All, But Disk/Key The system boot will not stop for a disk or keyboard error; it will stop for all other errors.

#### Base Memory

Displays the amount of base (or conventional) memory installed in the system. The value of the base memory is typically 512K for systems with 512K memory installed on the motherboard or 640K for systems with 640K or more memory installed on the motherboard.

#### **Extended Memory**

Displays the amount of extended memory detected during boot-up.

#### Total Memory

Displays the total memory available in the system.

#### 3.1.2 Advanced BIOS Features

The Advanced BIOS Features allows you to configure your system for basic operation. Some entries are defaults required by the mainboard, while others, if enabled, will improve the performance of your system or let you set some features according to your preference.

#### Virus Warning

This field protects the boot sector and partition table of your hard disk drive. When this field is enabled, the Award BIOS will monitor the boot sector and partition table of the hard disk drive. If an attempt is made to write to the boot sector or partition table of the hard disk drive, the BIOS will halt the system and an error message will appear.

After seeing the error message, if necessary, you will be able to run an anti-virus program to locate and remove the problem before any damage is done.

Many disk diagnostic programs which attempt to access the boot sector table will cause the warning message to appear. If you are running such a program, we recommend that you first disable this field. Also, disable this field if you are installing or running certain

operating systems like Windows® 98/2000/ME/XP or the operating system may not install nor work.

#### CPU LI & L2 Cache

These fields speed up the memory access.

#### Quick Power On Self Test

This field speeds up Power On SelfTest (POST) after you power on the system. It allows the system to skip certain tests while booting, therefore decreasing the time needed to boot the system.

# First Boot Device, Second Boot Device, Third Boot Device and Boot Other Device

Select the drive to boot first, second and third in the "First Boot Device" "Second Boot Device" and "Third Boot Device" fields respectively. The BIOS will boot the operating system according to the sequence of the drive selected. Set "Boot Other Device" to Enabled if you wish to boot from another device.

#### Swap Floppy Drive

When this field is enabled and the system is booting from the floppy drive, the system will boot from drive B instead of drive A. When this option is disabled and the system is booting from the floppy drive, the system will boot from drive A. You must have two floppy drives to use this function.

#### Boot Up Floppy Seek

When enabled, the BIOS will check whether the floppy disk drive installed is 40 or 80 tracks. Note that the BIOS cannot distinguish between 720K, I.2M, I.44M and 2.88M drive types as they are all 80 tracks. When disabled, the BIOS will not search for the type of floppy disk drive by track number. Note that there will not be any warning message if the drive installed is 360KB.

#### Boot Up NumLock Status

This allows you to determine the default state of the numeric keypad. By default, the system boots up with NumLock on wherein the function of the numeric keypad is the number keys. When set to Off, the function of the numeric keypad is the arrow keys.

#### Typematic Rate Setting

- Disabled Continually holding down a key on your keyboard will cause the BIOS to report that the key is down.
- Enabled The BIOS will not only report that the key is down, but will first wait for a moment, and, if the key is still down, it will begin to report that the key has been depressed repeatedly. For example, you would use such a feature to accelerate cursor movements with the arrow keys. You can then select the typematic rate and typematic delay in the "Typematic Rate (Chars/Sec)" and "Typematic Delay (Msec)" fields below.

#### Typematic Rate (Chars/Sec)

This field allows you to select the rate at which the keys are accelerated.

#### Typematic Delay (Msec)

This field allows you to select the delay between when the key was first depressed and when the acceleration begins.

#### Security Option

This field determines when the system will prompt for the password - everytime the system boots or only when you enter the BIOS setup. Set the password in the Set Supervisor/User Password submenu.

- System The system will not boot and access to Setup will be denied unless the correct password is entered at the prompt.
- Setup The system will boot, but access to Setup will be denied unless the correct password is entered at the prompt.

#### OS Select for DRAM > 64MB

This field allows you to access the memory that is over  $64\mbox{MB}$  in OS/2.

#### HDD S.M.A.R.T. Capability

The system board supports SMART (Self-Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Technology) hard drives. SMART is a reliability prediction technology for ATA/IDE and SCSI drives. The drive will provide sufficient notice to the system or user to backup data prior to the drive's failure. The default is Disabled. If you are using hard drives that support S.M.A.R.T., set this field to Enabled. SMART is supported in ATA/33 or later hard drives.

#### Small Logo(EPA) Show

*Enabled* The EPA logo will appear during system boot-up. *Disabled* The EPA logo will not appear during system boot-up.

Onboard LAN Boot ROM (NS30-SL and NS35-SL only)

Enable this field if you wish to use the boot ROM (instead of a disk drive) to boot-up the system and access the local area network directly.

If you wish to change the boot ROM's settings, type the <Shift> and <F10> keys simultaneously when prompted during boot-up. Take note: you will be able to access the boot ROM's program (by typing <Shift> + <F10>) only when this field is enabled.

#### DRAM Clock/Drive Control

# IDE Primary Master/Slave PIO and IDE Secondary Master/Slave PIO

PIO means Programmed Input/Output. Rather than have the BIOS issue a series of commands to effect a transfer to or from the disk drive, PIO allows the BIOS to tell the controller what it wants and then let the controller and the CPU perform the complete task by themselves. This allows data and addresses to be stored in the internal buffer of the chip, thus reducing access time. Enable this field to achieve better performance.

#### UART2 Mode Select

- I. Connect your IrDA cable to connector J20 on the mainboard.
- Set the "UART2 Mode Select" field to the type of IrDA standard supported by your IrDA peripheral/device (IrDA or ASKIR). For better transmission of data, your IrDA peripheral device must be within a 30° angle and within a distance of I meter.
- 3. Set the "RxD TxD Active" and "IR Transmission Delay" fields appropriately.

#### RxD, TxD Active

The options are Hi, Lo; Lo, Hi; Lo, Lo; and Hi, Hi.

#### **IR Transmission Delay**

If this option is Enabled, transmission of data will be slower. This is recommended when you encounter transmission problem with your device.

#### **Onboard Parallel Port**

378/IRQ7, 3BC/IRQ7, 278/IRQ5 Selects the I/O address and IRQ for the onboard parallel port. Disabled Disables the onboard parallel port.

#### Parallel Port Mode

The options are SPP, EPP, ECP and ECP+EPP. These apply to standard specifications and will depend on the type and speed of your device. Refer to your peripheral's manual for the best option.

#### SPP

Allows normal speed operation but in one direction only.

#### "ECP (Extended Capabilities Port)"

Allows parallel port to operate in bidirectional mode and at a speed faster than the normal mode's data transfer rate.

#### "EPP (Enhanced Parallel Port)"

Allows bidirectional parallel port operation at maximum speed.

#### EPP Mode Select

This is used to select the EPP mode.

#### ECP Mode Use DMA

This is used to select the DMA channel used for the parallel port.

#### Game Port Address

This field is used to select the game port's address.

#### Midi Port Address

This field is used to select the MIDI port's address. If you have selected the MIDI port's address, you may select its IRQ in the "Midi Port IRQ" field.

#### Midi Port IRQ

This field is used to select the MIDI port's IRQ.

#### **USB** Controller

We recommend that you leave this field in its default setting - Enabled.

#### **USB Keyboard Support**

By default, USB Keyboard Support is Disabled. However, if you are using a USB keyboard under DOS, make sure to enable this function.

#### IDE HDD Block Mode

- *Enabled* The IDE HDD uses the block mode. The system BIOS will check the hard disk drive for the maximum block size the system can transfer. The block size will depend on the type of hard disk drive.
- Disabled The IDE HDD uses the standard mode.

#### Init Display First

This field is used to select whether to initialize AGP or PCI first when the system boots.

AGP	When the system boots, it will first initialize AGP.
PCI Slot	When the system boots, it will first initialize PCI.

#### AGP Auto Calibration

When the AGP Auto Calibration function is enabled, it allows the system to automatically calibrate the AGP's performance. We recommend that you leave this field in its default setting - Enabled.

This field is used to select the access interface of the IDE devices. The options are Embedded Bus and PCI Bus.

#### USBI Access Interface and USB0 Access Interface

This field is used to select the access interface of the USB I and USB 0 devices. The options are Embedded Bus and PCI Bus.

#### Audio Access Interface

This field is used to select the access interface of the audio device. The options are Embedded Bus and PCI Bus.

#### **ACPI** Function

#### Switch Function

The options are Disabled and Break/Wake.

#### MODEM Use IRQ

This field is used to set an IRQ channel for the modem installed in your system.

#### HDD Power Down

After the set time of system inactivity, the hard disk drive will be powered down while all other devices remain active.

#### Soft-Off by PWRBTN

This field allows you to select the method of powering off your system.

- Delay 4 Sec Regardless of whether the Power Management field is enabled or disabled, if the power button is pushed and released in less than 4 sec, the system enters the Suspend mode. The purpose of this function is to prevent the system from powering off in case you accidentally "hit" or pushed the power button. Push and release again in less than 4 sec to restore. Pushing the power button for more than 4 seconds will power off the system.

#### PCIPME Power Up Control

This field should be set to Enabled only if your PCI card such as LAN card or modem card uses the PCI PME (Power Management Event) signal to remotely wake up the PC. Refer to the card's documentation for more information.

#### USB Port Wake Up Control

This field, when enabled, allows you to use a USB device to wake up the system from the S3/S4/S5 state.

#### Hot Key Power Up Control

This field allows you to use Hot Keys to wake up the system.

#### PS2 Mouse Power Up Control

This field allows you to use the PS/2 mouse to wake up the system from the S3/S4/S5 state.

#### KB Power On Password

To use a password to wake up the system, move the cursor to this field and press <Enter>. Enter your password. You can enter up to 5 characters. Type in exactly the same password to confirm, then press <Enter>.



If you forgot the password, you must power-off the system, unplug the power cord and clear the CMOS data. Follow the steps in the "Jumper Settings for Clearing CMOS Data" section in chapter 2.

#### Power Up By Alarm

#### PCI IRQ Assignment

By default, an IRQ is automatically assigned to the PCI devices that are installed in the PCI slots.

If a PCI device has not been assigned an IRQ, you must manually assign an IRQ for the device. During system boot-up, you will see "NA" for the device that does not have an IRQ assigned.

#### CPU Temp. Prot. Function and CPU Temp. Prot. Alarm

The CPU Temperature Protection function has the capability of monitoring the CPU's temperature during system boot-up. To use this function, set the "CPU Temp. Prot. Function" field to "Enabled" then select the desired CPU temperature limit in the "CPU Temp. Prot. Alarm" field. Once the system has detected that the CPU's temperature exceeded the limit, 5 warning beeps will sound and at the same time, a warning message will appear on the boot-up screen instructing you to press <Del> in order to enter the main menu of the BIOS. If you did not press <Del>, the system will automatically power-off after the 5 warning beeps. You may either:

I. Press <Del> then enter a new CPU temperature limit;

or

2. Allow the system to power-off after the 5 warning beeps then check whether the heatsink and fan are mounted properly onto the CPU because high CPU temperature may be due to incorrect fan/ heatsink installation. Now restart the system. If the same problem persist, it may be that the CPU fan is damaged or it is not rotating properly. Try replacing it with a new fan. If it is due to other

contributing factors that resulted to high CPU temperature, you may need to set a lower CPU temperature limit.

#### **CPU Temperature References**

When you power-up a system, the BIOS message appears on the screen and the memory count begins. After the memory test, the CPU temperature range is normally between 32°C and 35°C. When you run an operating system then tried to reboot the system, the CPU temperature range at this time is between 40°C and 45°C. These temperature references serve as a guide when you select the CPU temperature limit.

#### Current System Temp., Current CPU Temperature, Current CPU Fan Speed and Current System Fan Speed

These fields show the internal temperature of the system, current temperature of the CPU, and the current fan speed of the CPU and system fans in RPM (Revolutions Per Minute).

#### CPU(V)

These fields show the voltage of the processor.

#### +3.3V, +5V, +12V, -12V, -5V, VBAT(V) and 5VSB(V)

These fields show the output voltage of the power supply.



#### <u>Note:</u>

The onboard hardware monitor function is capable of detecting "system health" conditions but if you want a warning message to pop-up or a warning alarm to sound when an abnormal condition occurs, you must install the Hardware Monitor utility. This utility is included in the CD that came with the mainboard. Refer to the Hardware Monitor section in chapter 4 for more information.

#### **CPU Clock Ratio**

This field is used to select the CPU's frequency ratio.



#### Important:

The frequency ratio of some processors may have been locked by the manufacturer. If you are using this kind of processor, setting an extended ratio for the processor will have no effect. The system will instead use its factory default ratio.

#### Auto Detect DIMM/PCI Clk

When enabled, the system will automatically send clock signals to existing DIMM or PCI devices.

#### Spread Spectrum Modulated

Leave this field in its default setting. Do not alter this setting unless advised by an engineer or technician.

#### CPU Host/SDRAM/PCI Clock

This field provides several options for selecting the external system bus clock of the processor: When selecting the external bus clock, the SDRAM clock and PCI clock will at the same time appear next to the external bus clock selected. For example, if you selected "100/ 100/33MHz", 100MHz is the external bus clock, 100MHz is the SDRAM clock and 33MHz is the PCI clock. Since the system board uses DDR SDRAM DIMM, the SDRAM clock will run double the speed of that shown in this field. Therefore, if the SDRAM clock shown is "100MHz", the system will actually run at "200MHz". Regardless of the type of processor used, the default setting is "Default". Under this setting, the system will run according to the processor's clock frequency.



#### <u>Important:</u>

Overclocking may result in the processor's or system's instability and is not guaranteed to provide better system performance.

If, in the "CPU Clock Ratio" or "CPU Host/SDRAM/PCI Clock" field, you selected an option other than the default setting and is unable to boot up the system, there are 2 methods of booting up the system and going back to its default setting.

Method I:

Clear the CMOS data by setting JP5 to 1-2 On. All fields in the BIOS Setup will automatically be set to their default settings.

Method 2:

Press the <Insert> key and power button simultaneously, then release the power button first. Keep-on pressing the <Insert> key until the power-on screen appears. This will allow the system to boot according to the FSB of the processor. Now press the <Del> key to enter the main menu of the BIOS. Select "Frequency/Voltage Control" and set the "CPU Clock Ratio" or "CPU Host/SDRAM/PCI Clock" field to its default setting or an appropriate bus clock.



#### <u>Note:</u>

Use a PS/2 or AT (requires a DIN to mini DIN adapter) keyboard for method 2.

## 3.1.9 Load Fail-Safe Defaults

The "Load Fail-Safe Defaults" option loads the troubleshooting default values permanently stored in the ROM chips. These settings are not optimal and turn off all high performance features. You should use these values only if you have hardware problems. Highlight this option in the main menu and press <Enter>. The message below will appear.

Load Fail-Safe Defaults (Y/N)? N

If you want to proceed, type  $\langle Y \rangle$  and press  $\langle Enter \rangle$ . The default settings will be loaded.

## 3.1.10 Load Optimized Defaults

The "Load Optimized Defaults" option loads optimized settings from the BIOS ROM. Use the default values as standard values for your system. Highlight this option in the main menu and press <Enter>. The message below will appear:

Load Optimized Defaults (Y/N)? N

Type <Y> and press <Enter> to load the Setup default values.

## 3.1.11 Set Supervisor Password

If you want to protect your system and setup from unauthorized entry, set a supervisor's password with the "System" option selected in the Advanced BIOS Features. If you want to protect access to setup only, but not your system, set a supervisor's password with the "Setup" option selected in the Advanced BIOS Features. You will not be prompted for a password when you cold boot the system.

Use the arrow keys to highlight "Set Supervisor Password" and press <Enter>.The message below will appear.

#### Enter Password:

Type in the password. You are limited to eight characters. When done, the message below will appear:

#### Confirm Password:

You are asked to verify the password. Type in exactly the same password. If you type in a wrong password, you will be prompted to enter the correct password again. To delete or disable the password function, highlight "Set Supervisor Password" and press <Enter>, instead of typing in a new password. Press the <Esc> key to return to the main menu.

## 3.1.12 Set User Password

If you want another user to have access only to your system but not to setup, set a user's password with the "System" option selected in the Advanced BIOS Features. If you want a user to enter a password when trying to access setup, set a user's password with the "Setup" option selected in the Advanced BIOS Features.

Using user's password to enter Setup allows a user to access only "Set User Password" that appears in the main menu screen. Access to all other options is denied. To set, confirm, verify, disable or delete a user's password, follow the procedures described in the section "Set Supervisor Password".

## 3.1.13 Save & Exit Setup

When all the changes have been made, highlight "Save & Exit Setup" and press <Enter>. The message below will appear:

Save to CMOS and Exit (Y/N)? N

Type "Y" and press <Enter>. The modifications you have made will be written into the CMOS memory, and the system will reboot. You will once again see the initial diagnostics on the screen. If you wish to make additional changes to the setup, press <Ctrl> <Alt> <Esc> simultaneously or <Del> after memory testing is done.

## 3.1.14 Exit Without Saving

When you do not want to save the changes you have made, highlight "Exit Without Saving" and press <Enter>. The message below will appear:

Quit Without Saving (Y/N)? N

Type "Y" and press <Enter>. The system will reboot and you will once again see the initial diagnostics on the screen. If you wish to make any changes to the setup, press <Ctrl> <Alt> <Esc> simultaneously or <Del> after memory testing is done.

## 3.2 Updating the BIOS

To update the BIOS, you will need the new BIOS file and a flash utility, AWDFLASH.EXE. Please contact technical support or your sales representative for these files.

- I. Save the BIOS along with the flash utility AWDFLASH.EXE to a floppy disk.
- 2. Insert the floppy disk into a floppy drive and power-on the system. Press the <Alt> and <F2> keys simultaneously. The utility, which works only in DOS mode, will update the new BIOS file to the programmable flash EEPROM that is on the mainboard. The new BIOS will permanently replace the original BIOS content after flashing.

## 4.1 Desktop Management Interface (DMI)

The system board comes with a DMI built into the BIOS. DMI, along with the appropriately networked software, is designed to make inventory, maintenance and troubleshooting of computer systems easier. With DMI, a network administrator or MIS engineer can remotely access some information about a particular computer system without physically going to it. Quite often a service call may be unnecessary as the problem can be solved remotely.

The DMI utility in the BIOS automatically records various information about your system configuration. Information about the type and speed of CPU, type and amount of memory for each memory slot, BIOS revision level, types of add-in PCI boards and components, certain revision numbers of hardware installed, etc. are automatically detected and stored in the DMI pool, which is a part of the system board's Plug and Play BIOS. Additional information, such as ISA based peripherals, which may not be automatically detected, can be manually recorded in the DMI pool by using the Add DMI menu. The DMI pool data is then verified or updated whenever the system hardware or setup is altered.

## 4.1.1 Running the DMI Utility

To run the DMI utility, type: DMICFG.EXE. You can download this utility from ftp.dfiusa.com - /utilities/DMI directory.

The DMI utility must run in real mode with at least 180K of base memory. Memory managers like HIMEM.SYS (required by Windows) must not be installed. You may do this by using one of the 3 methods listed below.

- Boot up from a system diskette without the AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files,
- 2. "REM" HIMEM.SYS in the CONFIG.SYS, or
- 3. Press <F5> during bootup to bypass your AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files.

The four menus located on top of the DMI Configuration Utility screen are Edit DMI, Add DMI, Load DMI File and Save DMI File. Use the  $\leftarrow$  or  $\rightarrow$  (left or right) arrow keys to select a menu from the Menu bar.

On the left side of the screen is a list of the system configuration items. Use the  $\uparrow$  or  $\downarrow$  (up or down) arrow keys to select an item.

The commands at the bottom of the screen will allow you to navigate through the various setup menus.

## Edit DMI

- I. Use the  $\leftarrow$  or  $\rightarrow$  arrow keys to select the Edit DMI menu.
- 2. Highlight the item on the left screen that you would like to edit by using the  $\uparrow$  or  $\downarrow$  arrow keys, then press <Enter>.

It also allows you to manually set a range to the items being monitored. If the values are over or under the set range, a warning message will pop-up. The utility can also be configured so that a beeping alarm will sound whenever an error occurs. We recommend that you use the "Default Setting" which is the ideal setting that would keep the system in good working condition.

## Appendix B - System Error Message

When the BIOS encounters an error that requires the user to correct something, either a beep code will sound or a message will be displayed in a box in the middle of the screen and the message, PRESS FI TO CONTINUE, CTRL-ALT-ESC or DEL TO ENTER SETUP, will be shown in the information box at the bottom. Enter Setup to correct the error.

## **B.I POST Beep**

There are two kinds of beep codes in the BIOS. One code indicates that a video error has occured and the BIOS cannot initialize the video screen to display any additional information. This beep code consists of a single long beep followed by three short beeps. The other code indicates that a DRAM error has occured. This beep code consists of a single long beep.

## **B.2 Error Messages**

One or more of the following messages may be displayed if the BIOS detects an error during the POST. This list indicates the error messages for all Awards BIOSes:

#### CMOS BATTERY HAS FAILED

The CMOS battery is no longer functional. It should be replaced.



#### Caution:

Danger of explosion if battery incorrectly replaced. Replace only with the same or equivalent type recommended by the manufacturer. Dispose of used batteries according to the battery manufacturer's instructions.

#### CMOS CHECKSUM ERROR

Checksum of CMOS is incorrect. This can indicate that CMOS has become corrupt. This error may have been caused by a weak battery. Check the battery and replace if necessary.

#### DISPLAY SWITCH IS SET INCORRECTLY

The display switch on the motherboard can be set to either monochrome or color. This indicates the switch is set to a different

setting than indicated in Setup. Determine which setting is correct, either turn off the system and change the jumper or enter Setup and change the VIDEO selection.

FLOPPY DISK(S) fail (80) Unable to reset floppy subsystem.

Hard Disk(s) fail (80) HDD reset failed.

Keyboard is locked out - Unlock the key

The BIOS detects that the keyboard is locked. Keyboard controller is pulled low.

Cannot initialize the keyboard. Make sure the keyboard is attached correctly and no keys are being pressed during the boot.

Manufacturing POST loop

System will repeat POST procedure infinitely while the keyboard controller is pull low. This is also used for the M/B burn in test at the factory.

BIOS ROM checksum error - System halted The checksum of ROM address F0000H-FFFFFH is bad.

Memory test fail

The BIOS reports memory test fail if the memory has error(s).

## Appendix C - Troubleshooting

## C.I Troubleshooting Checklist

This chapter of the manual is designed to help you with problems that you may encounter with your personal computer. To efficiently troubleshoot your system, treat each problem individually. This is to ensure an accurate diagnosis of the problem in case a problem has multiple causes.

Some of the most common things to check when you encounter problems while using your system are listed below.

- I. The power switch of each peripheral device is turned on.
- 2. All cables and power cords are tightly connected.
- 3. The electrical outlet to which your peripheral devices are connected is working. Test the outlet by plugging in a lamp or other electrical device.
- 4. The monitor is turned on.
- 5. The display's brightness and contrast controls are adjusted properly.
- 6. All add-in boards in the expansion slots are seated securely.
- 7. Any add-in board you have installed is designed for your system and is set up correctly.

## Monitor/Display

If the display screen remains dark after the system is turned on:

- 1. Make sure that the monitor's power switch is on.
- 2. Check that one end of the monitor's power cord is properly attached to the monitor and the other end is plugged into a working AC outlet. If necessary, try another outlet.
- 3. Check that the video input cable is properly attached to the monitor and the system's display adapter.
- 4. Adjust the brightness of the display by turning the monitor's brightness control knob.

## Troubleshooting

#### The picture seems to be constantly moving.

- 1. The monitor has lost its vertical sync. Adjust the monitor's vertical sync.
- 2. Move away any objects, such as another monitor or fan, that may be creating a magnetic field around the display.
- 3. Make sure your video card's output frequencies are supported by this monitor.

#### The screen seems to be constantly wavering.

 If the monitor is close to another monitor, the adjacent monitor may need to be turned off. Fluorescent lights adjacent to the monitor may also cause screen wavering.

## **Power Supply**

#### When the computer is turned on, nothing happens.

- Check that one end of the AC power cord is plugged into a live outlet and the other end properly plugged into the back of the system.
- 2. Make sure that the voltage selection switch on the back panel is set for the correct type of voltage you are using.
- 3. The power cord may have a "short" or "open". Inspect the cord and install a new one if necessary.

## Floppy Drive

#### The computer cannot access the floppy drive.

- 1. The floppy diskette may not be formatted. Format the diskette and try again.
- 2. The diskette may be write-protected. Use a diskette that is not write-protected.
- 3. You may be writing to the wrong drive. Check the path statement to make sure you are writing to the targeted drive.
- 4. There is not enough space left on the diskette. Use another diskette with adequate storage space.

## Hard Drive

#### Hard disk failure.

- I. Make sure the correct drive type for the hard disk drive has been entered in the BIOS.
- 2. If the system is configured with two hard drives, make sure the bootable (first) hard drive is configured as Master and the second hard drive is configured as Slave. The master hard drive must have an active/bootable partition.

#### Excessively long formatting period.

 If your hard drive takes an excessively long period of time to format, it is likely a cable connection problem. However, if your hard drive has a large capacity, it will take a longer time to format.

## Parallel Port

#### The parallel printer doesn't respond when you try to print.

- 1. Make sure that your printer is turned on and that the printer is on-line.
- 2. Make sure your software is configured for the right type of printer attached.
- 3. Verify that the onboard LPT port's I/O address and IRQ settings are configured correctly.
- 4. Verify that the attached device works by attaching it to a parallel port that is working and configured correctly. If it works, the printer can be assumed to be in good condition. If the printer remains inoperative, replace the printer cable and try again.

## Serial Port

The serial device (modem, printer) doesn't output anything or is outputting garbled characters.

Troubleshooting

- I. Make sure that the serial device's power is turned on and that the device is on-line.
- 2. Verify that the device is plugged into the correct serial port on the rear of the computer.
- 3. Verify that the attached serial device works by attaching it to a serial port that is working and configured correctly. If the serial device does not work, either the cable or the serial device has a problem. If the serial device works, the problem may be due to the onboard I/O or the address setting.
- 4. Make sure the COM settings and I/O address are configured correctly.

## Keyboard

## Nothing happens when a key on the keyboard was pressed.

- 1. Make sure the keyboard is properly connected.
- 2. Make sure there are no objects resting on the keyboard and that no keys are pressed during the booting process.

## System Board

- Make sure the add-in card is seated securely in the expansion slot. If the add-in card is loose, power off the system, re-install the card and power up the system.
- 2. Check the jumper settings to ensure that the jumpers are properly set.
- 3. Verify that all memory modules are seated securely into the memory sockets.
- 4. Make sure the memory modules are in the correct locations.
- 5. If the board fails to function, place the board on a flat surface and seat all socketed components. Gently press each component into the socket.
- 6. If you made changes to the BIOS settings, re-enter setup and load the BIOS defaults.
