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# Chapter 1 INTRODUCTION

#### FEATURES

#### **CPU**

- 1. Supports Intel Pentium II, Pentium III and Celeron CPUs using SLOT 1 at 233 ~ 800MHz or higher.
- 2. Supports CPU voltage auto detect circuit.
- 3. Supports 66/100/133MHz Bus Clock with auto detect(BIOS provides 75/83/103/124/133/140/150MHz Bus Clock without auto detect).

#### Chipset



- Note: 1. Make sure that the SDRAM module not only has to be 168pin DIMM but designed for 3.3V unbuffered SDRAM as well. Double check with the SDRAM supplier before install any SDRAMs. The mainboard manufacturer has no obligation to any damage of the board by using the incorrect specification of SDRAM.
  - 2. For 100MHz CPU encironment, the SDRAM must compliant PC-100 specification, otherwise, the system maybe unstable.(67FV<sup>+</sup>)
  - 3. For 133MHz CPU encironment, the SDRAM must compliant PC-133 specification, otherwise, the system maybe unstable. (67FVI<sup>+</sup>)
  - 4. For support WOL, the ATX power supply has to have at least 5V/720mA standby current.

# System Memory Configuration

This VIA 693A motherboard supports 168 pin DIMM of 8MB, 16MB, 32MB, 64MB, 128MB or 256MB to form a memory size between 8MB to 768MB (SDRAM). VIA 693A chipsets provide "Table Free" function. It means that users can install DRAM with any configuration and in any bank, and that is why the DRAM table is not needed but do remember that the DRAM must be 3.3V type.

#### IDE LED Activity Light (J2 pin1-4)

This connector connects to the hard disk activity indicatorlight on the case.

#### Infrared Port Module Connector (J2 pin6-10)

The system board provides a 5-pin infrared connector-R1 for an optional wireless transmitting and receiving module. Pin 6 through 10 are Transmit, GND, Receive (low speed), Receive (high speed), and Vcc, respectively.

## Power Switch (J2 pin12, pin13)

Power Switch: Toggle this pin for turning on/off of the Power supply (for ATX power only).

### Speaker Connector (J3 pin1-4)

The speaker connector is a 4-pin connector for connecting the system and the speaker. (See the following drawing for jumper position.)

#### Reset Switch (J3 pin5, 6)

The system board has a 2-pin connector for rebooting your computer without having to turn off your power switch. This prolongs the life of the system's power supply.


### Power LED and Keylock Switch (J3 pin8-12)



### Flash Memory: BIOS Update

- Download BIOS files and flash utility from your board vendor. The files are awdflash.exe and \*.bin file.
- Copy them to bootable diskette and boot from the diskette. The diskette cannot include memory manager e.g. emm386.exe, qemm or himem.sys file, otherwise there will appear an error message "insufficient memory".
- 3. Type "awdflash filename (XXXX.bin)".
- 4. Next screen will ask you save current BIOS to file or not? Depends on your diskette capacity, choose **Y** or **N** for this option.
- 5. Then screen asks you programming the flash memory now? Type **Y** for this option.
- 6. Programming finished, utility will ask you to reboot system.
- 7. Reset system and press **DEL** key enter BIOS setup screen.
- 8. Select "LOAD BIOS DEFAULTS", press ENTER, press Y, press F10, press Y. Finish update process.

#### **VIA Patch Code Installation**

#### Windows95/Windows98:

- 1. Go to the CD-ROM disk, we suggest the CD-ROM title is D:\.
- 2. Find and run D:\Patch\Via\patch9x\Setup\Setup.exe
- Select "Install VIA Chipset Functions' Registry", then it will automatically install this program.

Note! This program should be installed before any other VIA's drivers.

#### VIA AGP VxD Driver for Windows 9x Installation

#### Windows95/Windows98:

- 1. Go to the CD-ROM disk, we suggest the CD-ROM title is D:\.
- 2. Find and run D:\Driver\Via\Agp\Setup\Setup\setup.exe
- 3. Select "Install VIA AGP VxD in turbo mode" or "Install VIA AGP VxD normal mode", then it will automatically install this program.

# VIA PCI IRQ Routing Miniport for Windows 9x Installation

#### Windows95/Windows98:

- 1. Go to the CD-ROM disk, we suggest the CD-ROM title is D:\.
- 2. Find and run D:\Patch\Via\Virg9x\Setup.exe

Note: Before install Windows98, user must enable two functions for this miniport driver in the BIOS menu, one is "OnChip USB" in the "Chipset Features Setup" and another is "Assign IRQ for USB" in the "PNP/PCI Configuration Setup".

There is a convenient way to install all of VIA drivers:

- 1. Make sure that the CD is in the CD-ROM and we suggest the CD-ROM title is D:\.
- 2. Go and find the directory "D:\PATCH\VIA\", find a program "4in14xx.exe".
- 3. Run the program after copied it to your hard disk.
- 4. Then the program will unzip all files including "setup.exe".
- Run "setup.exe". And the setup process will finish installation of all drivers automatically.

# Onboard AC97 Audio Codec Controller Driver Installation for Windows95/Windows98

- 1. Go to CD-ROM driver, we suggest the CD-ROM title is D:\.
- 2. Find and run D:\DRIVER\AUDIO\VIA AC97\SETUP.EXE or 68USR1XX.EXE
- Then the setup program will detect your O.S. to install relative files into your system.
- 4. Reboot the computer.

NOTE: 1. IF USER WANT TO USE EXTERNAL SOUND CARD, USER MUST RUN BIOS PROGRAM TO DISABLE "Onchip Sound" option in the "Chipset Feature Setup" and "Onboard Legacy Audio" option in the "Integrated Peripherals".

- 2. UNDER WINDOWS95, USER HAS TO INSTALL DirectX FOR AGP ENVIRONMENT.
- IF USER'S HARD DISK SUPPORTS Ultra ATA66, THEN USER MUST SELECT THE SPECIFIC CABLE FOR THE BEST TRANSMISSION TO Ultra ATA66!

# Chapter 3 BIOS SETUP

This 693 Apollo motherboard comes with the AWARD BIOS from AWARD Software Inc. Enter the Award BIOS program Main Menu by:

 Turn on or reboot the system. After a series of diagnostic checks, the following message will appear:

PRESS <DEL> TO ENTER SETUP

2. Press the <DEL> key and the main program screen will appear as follows.

- 5. In the Main Menu, "SAVE AND EXIT SETUP" saves your changes and reboots the system, and "EXIT WITHOUT SAVING" ignores your changes and exits the program.

#### Standard CMOS Setup

Standard CMOS Setup allows you to record some basic system hardware configuration and set the system clock and error handling. You only need to modify the configuration values of this option when you change your system hardware configuration or the configuration stored in the CMOS memory gets lost or damaged.

Run the Standard CMOS Setup as follows:

2. Use one of the arrow keys to move between options and modify the selected options by using PgUp/PgDn/+/- keys.

A short description of the screen options is as follows:

Date (mm:dd:yy) Time (hh:mm:ss) Set the current date and time.

Primary (Secondary) Master/Slave This field records the specifications for all non-SCSI hard disk drives installed in your system. Refer to the respective documentation on

how to install the drives.

Drive A/B

Set this field to the type(s) of floppy disk drive(s) installed in your system.

The choices are: 360KB, 5.25 in., 1.2MB, 5.25 in., 720KB, 3.5 in.,

1.44M, 3.5 in. (default), 2.88MB, 3.5 in., or None

Video

Set this field to the type of video display card installed in the system. The choices are: Monochrome; Color 40x25; VGA/EGA (default);

or Color 80x25

**Halt On** 

Set this warning feature for the type of errors that will cause the system to halt. The choices are: All Errors (default); No Errors; All, But Keyboard;

All, But Diskette; or All, But Disk/Key

Press <ESC> to return to the Main Menu when you finish setting up the "Standard CMOS Setup"

#### **BIOS Features Setup**

- Use one of the arrow keys to move between options and modify the selected options by using PgUp/PgDn/+/- keys. An explanation of the <F> keys follows:
- <F1>: "Help" gives options available for each item. Shift <F2>: Change color.
- <F5>: Get the previous values. These values are the values with which the user started in the current session.
- <F6>: Load all options with the BIOS default values.
- <F7>: Load all options with the Setup default values.

A short description of screen options follows:

**Virus Warning** 

Enabled: Activates automatically

when the system boots up causing a warning message to appear if there is anything attempting to access the

boot sector or hard disk

partition table.

Disabled: No warning message

will appear when there is something attempting to access the boot sector or hard disk partition table

Note: Many diagnostic (or boot manager) programs which attempt to access the boot sector table can cause the above warning message. If you will be running such a program, we recommend that you disable the

virus protection first.

**CPU Internal** Cache

Choose Enabled (default) or Disabled. This option allows you to enable or disable the CPU's internal cache.

**External Cache** 

Choose Enabled (default) or Disabled. This option allows you to enable or disable the external cache memory.

**CPU L2 Cache ECC Checking** 

Use default setting.

### **Quick Power On** Self Test

Choose Enabled (default) or Disabled. This option allows you to speed up the Power-On Self-Test routine.

#### **Boot Sequence**

Default is "A, C, SCSI" This option determines which drive to look at first for an operating system.

#### Swap Floppy Drive

Choose Enabled or Disabled (default). This option swaps floppy drive assignments when it is enabled.

#### **Boot Up Floppy** Seek

Enabled (default): During POST, BIOS checks the track number of the floppy disk drive to see whether it is 40 or 80 tracks. Disabled: During POST, BIOS will not check the track number of the

floppy disk drive.

# Status

**Boot Up NumLock** Choose On (default) or Off. This option lets user activate the NumLock function at boot-up.

### **IDE HDD Block** Mode

Choose Enabled (default) or Disabled. If your hard disk size is larger than 540MB, choose Enabled, and, if you are using the IDE HDD Auto Detection option, the BIOS will choose this option

automatically.

Note: Some older model HDDs don't provide this feature.

# Gate A20 Option Choose Normal or Fast (default).

This option allows the RAM to access the memory above 1MB by using the fast gate A20 line.

# Memory Parity /ECC Check

Choose Enabled or Disabled

# Typematic Rate Setting

Choose Enabled or Disabled (default). Enable this option to adjust the keystroke repeat rate.

# Typematic Rate (Chars/Sec)

Range between 6 (default) and 30 characters per second. This option controls the speed of repeating keystrokes.

# Typematic Delay (Msec)

Choose 250 (default), 500, 750, and 1000. This option sets the time interval for displaying the first and the second characters.

# **Security Option**

Choose System or Setup (default). This option prevents unauthorized system boot-up or use of BIOS Setup.

# PCI/VGA palette Snoop

Choose Enabled or Disabled (default). It determines whether or not the MPEG ISA cards can work with PCI/VGA.

OS Select for DRAM > 64MB

Non-OS2 (default): For Non-OS/2

system.

OS: For OS/2 system.

Video BIOS Shadow Enabled (default): Map the VGA

BIOS to system RAM.

Disabled: Will not map the VGA BIOS

to system RAM.
