#### Chapter 1

## **Introducing the Mainboard**

### Introduction

Congratulations on purchasing the KOB 815EP TFSX mainboard. The KOB 815EP TFSX mainboard is an ATX mainboard that uses a 4-layer printed circuit board and measures 304 mm x 190 mm. The mainboard features a Socket 370 that accommodates Intel Celeron, Pentium III, and Tualatin processors supporting frontside bus (FSB) speeds up to 133 MHz.

**Note:** Intel's Tualatin (pronounced "TWO-ala-tin") is the newest Pentium III CPU boasting clock speeds up to 1.13GHz.

The KOB 815EP TFSX incorporates the Intel 815EP chipset, which combines support for SDRAM, ATA-100, and 4xAGP. The 82801BA I/O controller hub makes a direct connection between the graphics system, the IDE controller, and the PCI bus and uses accelerated hub architecture to double the bandwidth between these components enabling more lifelike audio and video. The 82801BA I/O controller hub includes an integrated audio-codec controller that lets the processor more effectively decode sound generated by the integrated audio system.



## **Choosing a Computer Case**

There are many types of computer cases on the market. The mainboard complies with the specifications for the ATX system case. Some features on the mainboard are implemented by cabling connectors on the mainboard to indicators and switches on the system case. Ensure that your case supports all the features required. The mainboard can support one or two floppy diskette drives and four enhanced IDE drives. Ensure that your case has sufficient power and space for all the drives that you intend to install.

Most cases have a choice of I/O templates in the rear panel. Make sure that the I/O template in the case matches the I/O ports installed on the rear edge of the mainboard.

This mainboard has an ATX form factor of 190 x 304 mm. Choose a case that accommodates this form factor.

# Safety Precautions

Follow these safety precautions when installing the mainboard:

- Wear a grounding strap attached to a grounded device to avoid damage from static electricity.
- Discharge static electricity by touching the metal case of a safely grounded object before working on the mainboard.
- Leave components in the static-proof bags they came in.
- Hold all circuit boards by the edges. Do not bend circuit boards.



# **Checking Jumper Settings**

This section explains how to set jumpers for correct configuration of the mainboard.

### **Setting Jumpers**


Use the mainboard jumpers to set system configuration options. Jumpers with more than one pin are numbered. When setting the jumpers, ensure that the jumper caps are placed on the correct pins.



**Jumper 1** – enables you to clear the BIOS:

- 1. Turn the system off.
- 2. Short pins 2 and 3 on JP1.
- 3. Return the jumper to the normal setting.
- 4. Turn the system on. The BIOS is returned to the default settings.

**Jumper 2** – enable this jumper if you want keyboard activity to awaken the system from power saving mode.

**Jumper 3** – enables you to prevent the BIOS from being updated (flashed). Set the jumper to unlock to update your BIOS. After updating the BIOS, change it to the locked setting. For instructions on updating the BIOS refer to Chapter 3.


# Installing the Mainboard in a Case

Refer to the following illustration and instructions for installing the mainboard in a case:

**Note:** Do not overtighten the screws as this can stress the mainboard.


Most system cases have mounting brackets installed in the case, which correspond to the holes in the mainboard. Place the mainboard over the mounting brackets and secure the mainboard onto the mounting brackets with screws.



Ensure that your case has an I/O template that supports the I/O ports and expansion slots on your mainboard.

# **Connecting Case Components**

After you have installed the mainboard into a case, you can begin connecting the mainboard components. Refer to the following:



- 1. Connect the case power supply connector to ATX1.
- 2. Connect the CPU cooling fan cable to CPUFAN1.
- 3. Connect the case cooling fan connector to CASFAN1

## **Installing Hardware**

### **Installing the Processor**

**Caution:** When installing a CPU heatsink and cooling fan make sure that you DO NOT scratch the mainboard or any of the surface-mount resistors with the clip of the cooling fan. If the clip of the cooling fan scrapes across the mainboard, you may cause serious damage to the mainboard or its components.

On most mainboards, there are small surface-mount resistors near the processor socket, which may be damaged if the cooling fan is carelessly installed.

Avoid using cooling fans with sharp edges on the fan casing and the clips. Also, install the cooling fan in a well-lit work area so that you can clearly see the mainboard and processor socket.

#### **Before installing the Processor**


This mainboard automatically determines the CPU clock frequency and system bus frequency for the processor. You may be able to change these settings by making changes to jumpers on the mainboard, or changing the settings in the system Setup Utility. We strongly recommend that you do not overclock processors or other components to run faster than their rated speed.

**Warning:** Overclocking components can adversely affect the reliability of the system and introduce errors into your system. Overclocking can permanently damage the mainboard by generating excess heat in components that are run beyond the rated limits.

This mainboard has a Socket 370 processor socket. When choosing a processor, consider the performance requirements of the system. Performance is based on the processor design, the clock speed and system bus frequency of the processor, and the quantity of internal cache memory and external cache memory.

### **CPU Installation Procedure**


The following illustration shows CPU installation components:



**Note:** The pin-1 corner is empty on the socket and CPU.

Follow these instructions to install the CPU:

- 1. Pull the CPU socket locking lever away from the socket to unhook it and raise the locking lever to the upright position.
- 2. Match the pin-1 corner on the CPU socket and the pin-1 corner on the processor and insert the processor into the socket. Do not use force.



- 3. Swing the locking lever down and hook it under the latch on the edge of the socket.
- 4. Plug the CPU fan power cable into the CPU cooling fan power supply on the mainboard (CPUFAN1).

**Note:** After you have assembled the system, you must set the correct clock speed and frontside bus (FSB) speed. Check the jumper section in Appendix A if your mainboard has jumpers that control the FSB, and refer to Frequency Voltage Control on page 56 for more information.



#### **Installation Procedure**


The mainboard accommodates three memory modules. You must install at least one module in any of the three slots. Each module can be installed with 32 MB to 512 MB of memory; total memory capacity is 512 MB.



Refer to the following to install the memory modules.

 Align the memory module with the slot. The DIMM slots are keyed with notches and the DIMMs are keyed with cutouts so that they can only be installed correctly. Check that the cutouts on the DIMM module edge connector match the notches in the DIMM slot:

- 2. Push the latches on each side of the DIMM slot down.
- 3. Align the memory module with the slot. The DIMM slots are keyed with notches and the DIMMs are keyed with cutouts so that they can only be installed correctly.
- 4. Check that the cutouts on the DIMM module edge connector match the notches in the DIMM slot:



- 5. Install the DIMM module into the slot and press it firmly down until it seats correctly. The slot latches are levered upwards and latch on to the edges of the DIMM.
- 6. Install any remaining DIMM modules.

### Installing a Hard Disk Drive/CD-ROM

This section describes how to install IDE devices such as a hard disk drive and a CD-ROM drive.

#### **About IDE Devices**

Your mainboard has a primary and secondary IDE channel interface (IDE1 and IDE2). An IDE ribbon cable supporting two IDE devices is bundled with the mainboard.

If you want to install more than two IDE devices, get a second IDE cable and you can add two more devices to the secondary IDE channel.


IDE devices have jumpers or switches that are used to set the IDE device as MASTER or SLAVE. Refer to the IDE device user's manual. When installing two IDE devices on one cable, ensure that one device is set to MASTER and the other device is set to SLAVE. The documentation of your IDE device explains how to do this.

#### **About UltraDMA**

This mainboard supports UltraDMA 66/100. UDMA is a technology that accelerates the performance of devices in the IDE channel. Install IDE devices that support UDMA and use IDE cables that support UDMA for better performance.

#### **Installing a Hard Disk Drive**

- Install the hard disk drive into the drive cage in your ATX system case.
- 2. Plug the IDE cable into IDE1 (A):




Note: Ribbon cable connectors are usually keyed so that they can only be installed correctly on the device connector. If the connector is not keyed, make sure that you match the pin-1 side of the cable connector with the pin-1 side of the device connector. Each connector has the pin-1 side clearly marked. The pin-1 side of each ribbon cable is always marked with a colored stripe on the cable.

- 3. Plug an IDE cable connector into the hard disk drive IDE connector (B). It doesn't matter which connector on the cable you use.
- 4. Plug a power cable from the case power supply into the power connector on the hard disk drive (C).

When you first start up your system, the BIOS should automatically detect your hard disk drive. If it doesn't, enter the Setup Utility and use the IDE Hard Disk Auto Detect feature to configure the hard disk drive that you have installed. See IDE HDD Auto-Detection on page 38 for more information.

#### Installing a CD-ROM/DVD Drive

- 1. Install the CD-ROM/DVD drive into the drive cage in your ATX system case.
- 2. Plug the IDE cable into IDE1 (A). If you have already installed an HDD, use the other connector on the IDE cable.



Note: Ribbon cable connectors are usually keyed so that they can only be installed correctly on the device connector. If the connector is not keyed, make sure that you match the pin-1 side of the cable connector with the pin-1 side of the device connector. Each connector has the pin-1 side clearly marked. The pin-1 side of each ribbon cable is always marked with a colored stripe on the cable.

3. Plug an IDE cable connector into the CD-ROM/DVD drive IDE connector (B). It doesn't matter which connector on the cable you use.


- 4. Plug a power cable from the case power supply into the power connector on the CD-ROM/DVD drive (C).
- Use the audio cable provided with the CD-ROM/DVD drive to connect to the mainboard CD-in connector CD1 or CD2 (D).

When you first start up your system, the BIOS should automatically detect your CD-ROM/DVD drive. If it doesn't, enter the Setup Utility and configure the CD-ROM/DVD drive that you have installed. See IDE Primary/Secondary Master/Slave (Auto) on page 38 for more information.

### **Installing a Floppy Diskette Drive**

The mainboard has a floppy diskette drive (FDD) interface and ships with a diskette drive ribbon cable that supports one or two floppy diskette drives. You can install a 5.25-inch drive and a 3.5-inch drive with various capacities. The floppy diskette drive cable has one type of connector for a 5.25-inch drive and another type of connector for a 3.5-inch drive.

- 1. Install the FDD into the drive cage in your ATX system case.
- 2. Plug the FDD cable into FDD1 (A):



Note: Ribbon cable connectors are usually keyed so that they can only be installed correctly on the device connector. If the connector is not keyed, make sure that you match the pin-1 side of the cable connector with the pin-1 side of the device connector. Each connector has the pin-1 side clearly marked. The pin-1 side of each ribbon cable is always marked with a colored stripe on the cable.

- 3. Plug the correct connector on the FDD cable for the 5.25-inch or 3.5-inch drive into the FDD connector (B).
- 4. Plug a power cable from the case power supply into the power connector on the FDD (C).

When you first start up your system, go immediately to the Setup Utility to configure the floppy diskette drives that you have installed. See Standard CMOS Features on page 37 for more information.

### **Installing Add-on Cards**

This mainboard has six 32-bit PCI (Peripheral Components Interconnect) expansion slots, one 4xAGP slot, and one Communications and Networking Riser (CNR) slot.

**4xAGP Slot** The 4xAGP slot is used to install a graph-

ics adapter that supports the 4xAGP specification and has a 4xAGP edge con-


nector.

**PCI Slots** PCI slots are used to install expansion

cards that have the 32-bit PCI interface.


**CNR Slot** This slot is used to insert CNR cards in-

cluding LAN, Modem, and Audio functions.



**Note:** Before installing an add-on card, check the documentation for the card carefully. If the card is not Plug and Play, you may have to manually configure the card before installation.

- 1. Remove a blanking plate from the system case corresponding to the slot you are going to use.
- 2. Install the edge connector of the add-on card into the expansion slot. Ensure that the edge connector is correctly seated in the slot.




3. Secure the metal bracket of the card to the system case with a screw.

**Note:** For some add-on cards, for example graphics adapters and network adapters, you have to install drivers and software before you can begin using the add-on card.

#### J1: Case open



# **Using BIOS**

# **About the Setup Utility**

The computer uses the latest Award BIOS with support for Windows Plug and Play. The CMOS chip on the mainboard contains the ROM setup instructions for configuring the mainboard BIOS.

The BIOS (Basic Input and Output System) Setup Utility displays the system's configuration status and provides you with options to set system parameters. The parameters are stored in battery-backed-up CMOS RAM that saves this information when the power is turned off. When the system is turned back on, the system is configured with the values you stored in CMOS.

The BIOS Setup Utility enables you to configure:

- Hard drives, diskette drives, and peripherals
- Video display type and display options
- · Password protection from unauthorized use
- Power management features

The settings made in the Setup Utility affect how the computer performs. Before using the Setup Utility, ensure that you understand the Setup Utility options.

This chapter provides explanations for Setup Utility options.

# **The Standard Configuration**

A standard configuration has already been set in the Setup Utility. However, we recommend that you read this chapter in case you need to make any changes in the future.

This Setup Utility should be used:

- when changing the system configuration
- when a configuration error is detected and you are prompted to make changes to the Setup Utility
- when trying to resolve IRQ conflicts
- when making changes to the Power Management configuration
- when changing the password or making other changes to the Security Setup

# **Entering the Setup Utility**

When you power on the system, BIOS enters the Power-On Self Test (POST) routines. POST is a series of built-in diagnostics performed by the BIOS. After the POST routines are completed, the following message appears:

### **Press DEL to enter SETUP**

## **Updating the BIOS**

You can download and install updated BIOS for this mainboard from the manufacturer's Web site. New BIOS provides support for new peripherals, improvements in performance, or fixes for known bugs. Install new BIOS as follows:

- 1. If your mainboard has a BIOS protection jumper, change the setting to allow BIOS flashing. (Refer to Appendix A for jumper settings.)
- 2. If your mainboard has an item called Firmware Write Protect in Advanced BIOS features, disable it. (Firmware Write Protect prevents BIOS from being overwritten.)
- Create a bootable system disk. (Refer to Windows online help for information on creating a bootable system disk.)
- 4. Download the Flash Utility and new BIOS file from the manufacturer's Web site. Copy these files to the system diskette you created in Step 3.
- Turn off your computer and insert the system diskette in your computer's diskette drive. (You might need to run the Setup Utility and change the boot priority items on the Advanced BIOS Features Setup page, to force your computer to boot from the floppy diskette drive first.)
- 6. At the A:\ prompt, type the Flash Utility program name and press <Enter>. You see a screen similar to the following:

- 7. Type the filename of the new BIOS in the "File Name to Program" text box. Follow the onscreen directions to update the mainboard BIOS.
- When the installation is complete, remove the floppy diskette from the diskette drive and restart your computer. If your mainboard has a Flash BIOS jumper, reset the jumper to protect the newly installed BIOS from being overwritten.

# **Using BIOS**

When you start the Setup Utility, the main menu appears. The main menu of the Setup Utility displays a list of the options that are available. A highlight indicates which option is currently selected. Use the cursor arrow keys to move the highlight to other options. When an option is highlighted, execute the option by pressing <Enter>.

Some options lead to pop-up dialog boxes that prompt you to verify that you wish to execute that option. Other options lead to dialog boxes that prompt you for information.

Some options (marked with a triangle ►) lead to submenus that enable you to change the values for the option. Use the cursor arrow keys to scroll through the items in the submenu.

In this manual, default values are enclosed in parenthesis. Submenu items are denoted by a triangle ►.

#### **Date and Time**

The Date and Time items show the current date and time on the computer. If you are running a Windows OS, these items are automatically updated whenever you make changes to the Windows Date and Time Properties utility.

#### IDE HDD Auto-Detection

Press <Enter> while this item is highlighted to prompt the Setup Utility to automatically detect and configure an IDE device on the IDE channel.

**Note:** If you are setting up a new hard disk drive that supports LBA mode, more than one line will appear in the parameter box. Choose the line that lists LBA for an LBA drive.

#### IDE Primary/Secondary Master/Slave (Auto)

Leave this item at Auto to enable the system to automatically detect and configure IDE devices on the channel. If it fails to find a device, change the value to Manual and then manually configure the drive by entering the characteristics of the drive in the items described below.

Refer to your drive's documentation or look on the drive casing if you need to obtain this information. If no device is installed, change the value to None.

**Note:** Before attempting to configure a hard disk drive, ensure that you have the configuration information supplied by the manufacturer of your hard drive. Incorrect settings can result in your system not recognizing the installed hard disk.

#### Access Mode

This item defines ways that can be used to access IDE hard disks such as LBA (Large Block Addressing). Leave this value at Auto and the system will automatically decide the fastest way to access the hard disk drive.

Press < Esc> to return to the Standard CMOS Features page.

#### Drive A/Drive B (1.44M, 3.5 in./None)

These items define the characteristics of any diskette drive attached to the system. You can connect one or two diskette drives.

#### Floppy 3 Mode Support (Disabled)

Floppy 3 mode refers to a 3.5-inch diskette with a capacity of 1.2 MB. Floppy 3 mode is sometimes used in Japan.

#### Video (EGA/VGA)

This item defines the video mode of the system. This mainboard has a built-in VGA graphics system; you must leave this item at the default value.

### Halt On (All Errors)

This item defines the operation of the system POST (Power On Self Test) routine. You can use this item to select which types of errors in the POST are sufficient to halt the system.

#### **Base Memory, Extended Memory, and Total Memory**

These items are automatically detected by the system at start up time. These are display-only fields. You cannot make changes to these fields.

#### **Anti-Virus Protection (Disabled)**

When enabled, this item provides protection against viruses that try to write to the boot sector and partition table of your hard disk drive. You need to disable this item when installing an operating system. We recommend that you enable this item as soon as you have installed an operating system.

**Note:** For complete protection against viruses, install virus software in your operating system and update the virus definitions regularly.

#### **CPU Internal Cache CPU Internal Cache (Enabled)**

All processors that can be installed in this mainboard use internal level 1 (L1) cache memory to improve performance. Leave this item at the default value for better performance.

#### **External Cache (Enabled)**

Most processors that can be installed in this system use external level 2 (L2) cache memory to improve performance. Leave this item at the default value for better performance.

#### **CPU L2 Cache ECC Checking (Enabled)**

#### **Report No FDD For WIN95 (Yes)**

If you are running a system with no floppy drive and using Windows 95, select Yes for this item to ensure compatibility with the Windows 95 logo certification. Otherwise, select No.

#### **SDRAM CAS Latency Time (3)**

This item enables you to select the CAS latency time in HCLKs of 2/2 or 3/3. The value is set at the factory depending on the DRAM installed. Do not change the values in this field unless you change the specifications of the installed DRAM or the installed CPU.

#### SDRAM Cycle Time Tras/Trc (7/9)

This item sets the minimum time from activation to activation of the same memory bank. When synchronous DRAM is installed, the number of clock cycles of CAS latency depends on the DRAM timing. We recommend that you leave this item at the default value.

#### SDRAM RAS-to-CAS Delay (3)

#### **On-Chip IDE Primary/Secondary PCI IDE (Enabled)**

Use these items to enable or disable the PCI IDE channels that are integrated on the mainboard.

#### IDE Primary/Secondary Master/Slave PIO (Auto)

Each IDE channel supports a master device and a slave device. These four items let you assign which kind of PIO (Programmed Input/Output) is used by IDE devices. Choose Auto to let the system auto detect which PIO mode is best, or select a PIO mode from 0-4.

#### IDE Primary/Secondary Master/Slave UDMA (Auto)

Each IDE channel supports a master device and a slave device. This mainboard supports UltraDMA technology, which provides faster access to IDE devices.

If you install a device that supports UltraDMA, change the appropriate item on this list to Auto. You may have to install the UltraDMA driver supplied with this mainboard in order to use an UltraDMA device.

#### **USB Controller (Enabled)**

Enable this item if you plan to use the Universal Serial Bus ports on this mainboard.

#### **USB Keyboard Support (Disabled)**

Enable this item if you plan to use a keyboard connected through the USB port in a legacy operating system (such as DOS) that does not support Plug and Play.

#### **Init Display First (PCI Slot)**

Use this item to specify whether your graphics adapter is installed in one of the PCI slots or is integrated on the mainboard.

Enable this field if your IDE hard drive supports block mode. Block mode enables BIOS to automatically detect the optimal number of block read and writes per sector that the drive can support and improves the speed of access to IDE devices.

#### **POWER ON Function (Hot KEY)**

Enables computer power on by keyboard, mouse, or hotkey activity.

#### **KB Power ON Password**

This field is available if the Onboard Serial Port 2 field is set to any option but Disabled. UART Mode Select enables you to select the infrared communication protocol: Normal (default), IrDA, or ASKIR. IrDA is an infrared communication protocol with a maximum baud rate up to 115.2K bps. ASKIR is Sharp's infrared communication protocol with a maximum baud rate up to 57.6K bps.

## **UR2 Duplex Mode (Half)**

This field is available when UART 2 Mode is set to either ASKIR or IrDA. This item enables you to determine the infrared function of the onboard infrared chip. The options are Full and Half (default).

Full-duplex means that you can transmit and send information simultaneously. Half-duplex is the transmission of data in both directions, but only one direction at a time.

#### **Onboard Parallel Port (378/IRQ7)**

This option is used to assign the I/O address and interrupt request (IRQ) for the onboard parallel port.

#### Parallel Port Mode (ECP)

Enables you to set the data transfer protocol for your parallel port. There are four options: SPP (Standard Parallel Port), EPP (Enhanced Parallel Port), ECP (Extended Capabilities Port) and ECP+EPP.

When the onboard parallel port is set to ECP mode, the parallel port can use DMA 3 or DMA 1.

#### **PWRON After PWR-Fail (Off)**

This item enables your computer to automatically restart or return to its last operating status after power returns from a power failure.

#### Game Port Address (201)

This item sets the I/O address for the game port.

#### Midi Port Address (330)

This item sets the I/O address for the Midi function.

#### Midi Port IRQ (10)

This item sets the interrupt request for the Midi function.

## **Power Management Setup Option**

This option lets you control system power management. The system has various power-saving modes including powering down the hard disk, turning off the video, suspending to RAM, and software power down that allows the system to be automatically resumed by certain events.

The power-saving modes can be controlled by timeouts. If the system is inactive for a time, the timeouts begin counting. If the inactivity continues so that the timeout period elapses, the system enters a power-saving mode. If the system is suspended or has been powered down by software, it can be resumed by a wake up call that is generated by incoming traffic to a modem, a LAN card, a PCI card, or a fixed alarm on the system realtime clock,

## **ACPI Function (Enabled)**

This mainboard supports ACPI (Advanced Configuration and Power management Interface). Use this item to enable or disable the ACPI feature.

Note: ACPI is a power management specification that makes hardware status information available to the operating system. ACPI enables a PC to turn its peripherals on and off for improved power management. It also allows the PC to be turned on and off by external devices, so that mouse or keyboard activity wakes up the computer.

#### **ACPI Suspend Type (S1(POS))**

Use this item to define how your system suspends. In the default, S1(POS), the suspend mode is equivalent to a software power down.

#### **Power Management Option (User Define)**

This item acts like a master switch for the power-saving modes and hard disk timeouts. If this item is set to Max Saving, power-saving modes occur after a short timeout. If this item is set to Min Saving, power-saving modes occur after a longer timeout. If the item is set to User Define, you can insert your own timeouts for the power-saving modes.

## **Video Off Method (DPMS)**

This item defines how the video is powered down to save power. This item is set to DPMS (Display Power Management Software) by default.

#### Video Off In Suspend (Yes)

This option defines if the video is powered down when the system is put into suspend mode.

#### **Suspend Type (Stop Grant)**

If this item is set to the default Stop Grant, the CPU will go into Idle Mode during power saving mode.

#### **MODEM Use IRQ (3)**

If you want an incoming call on a modem to automatically resume the system from a power-saving mode, use this item to specify the interrupt request line (IRQ) that is used by the modem. You might have to connect the fax/modem to the mainboard Wake On Modem connector for this feature to work.

#### **Suspend Mode (Disable)**

The CPU clock will be stopped and the video signal will be suspended if no Power Management events occur for a specified length of time. Full power function will return when a Power Management event is detected. Options are from 1 Min to 1 Hour and Disable.

#### **HDD PwrDown in Suspend (Enabled)**

When enabled, the HDD will spin down when the system enters suspend mode.

#### **HDD Power Down (Disable)**

The IDE hard drive will spin down if it is not accessed within a specified length of time. Options are from 1 Min to 15 Min and Disable.

#### **Soft-Off by PWRBTN (Instant-Off)**

Under ACPI (Advanced Configuration and Power management Interface) you can create a software power down. In a software power down, the system can be resumed by Wake Up Alarms. This item lets you install a software power down that is controlled by the power button on your system. If the item is set to Instant-Off, then the power button causes a software power down. If the item is set to Delay 4 Sec. then you have to hold the power button down for four seconds to cause a software power down.

#### Wake-Up by PCI Card (Disabled)

When this item is enabled, the system power will be turned on if there is any PCI card activity.

#### Power On by Ring (Disabled)

If this item is enabled, it allows the system to resume from a software power down or a power-saving mode whenever there is an incoming call to an installed fax/modem. You have to connect the fax/modem to a mainboard Wake On Modem connector for this feature to work.

#### Wake Up On LAN (Enabled)

When set to Enabled, the system power will be turned on if the LAN port receives an incoming signal. You have to connect the fax/modem to a mainboard Wake On LAN connector for this feature to work.

#### **Resume by Alarm (Disabled)**

When set to Enabled, additional fields become available and you can set the date (day of the month), hour, minute and second to turn on your system. When set to 0 (zero) for the day of the month, the alarm will power on your system every day at the specified time.

#### \*\* Reload Global Timer Events \*\*

Global Timer (power management) events are I/O events whose occurrence can prevent the system from entering a power saving mode or can awaken the system from such a mode. In effect, the system remains alert for anything that occurs to a device that is configured as Enabled, even when the system is in a power-down mode.

#### Primary/Secondary IDE 1/0 (Disabled)

When these items are enabled, the system will restart the power-saving timeout counters when any activity is detected on any of the drives or devices on the primary or secondary IDE channels.

## FDD, COM, LPT Port (Disabled)

When this item is enabled, the system will restart the powersaving timeout counters when any activity is detected on the floppy disk drive, serial ports, or the parallel port.

#### PCI PIRQ[A-D]# (Disabled)

When disabled, any PCI device set as the Master will not power on the system.

## **PNP/PCI Configuration Option**

This option configures how PnP (Plug and Play) and PCI expansion cards operate in your system. In the IRQ Resources submenu, if you assign an IRQ to Legacy ISA, then that Interrupt Request Line is reserved for a legacy ISA expansion card. Press <Esc> to close the IRQ Resources submenu.

In the Memory Resources submenu, use the first item Reserved Memory Base to set the start address of the memory you want to reserve for the ISA expansion card. Use the second item Reserved Memory Length to set the amount of reserved memory. Press <Esc> to close the Memory Resources submenu.

#### **PCI/VGA Palette Snoop (Disabled)**

This item is designed to overcome problems that can be caused by some non-standard VGA cards. This board includes a built-in VGA system that does not require palette snooping so you must leave this item disabled.

## **PCI Health Status Option**

On mainboards that support hardware monitoring, this item lets you monitor the parameters for critical voltages, critical temperatures, and fan speeds.

F6:Fail-Safe Defaults

#### Auto Detect DIMM/PCI Clk (Enabled)

When this item is enabled, BIOS will disable the clock signal of free DIMM and PCI slots.

F7:Optimized Defaults

#### **CPU Internal Core Speed (Auto)**

The value for this item will be automatically detected by the system. If you set this value to Manual, the CPU Host/PCI Clock and CPU Clock Ratio items appear.

#### **Spread Spectrum (Enabled)**

If you enable spread spectrum, it can significantly reduce the EMI (Electro-Magnetic Interference) generated by the system.

## CPU Host (66/33 MHz) PCI Clock (3.5/11.5)

F5:Previous Values

Use the CPU Host Clock to set the frontside bus frequency for the installed processor or processors (usually 133 MHz, 100 MHz or 66 MHz).

## **Load Fail-Safe Defaults Option**

This option opens a dialog box that lets you install fail-safe defaults for all appropriate items in the Setup Utility:

Press <Y> and then <Enter> to install the defaults. Press <N> and then <Enter> to not install the defaults. The fail-safe defaults place no great demands on the system and are generally stable. If your system is not functioning correctly, try installing the fail-safe defaults as a first step in getting your system working properly again. If you only want to install fail-safe defaults for a specific option, select and display that option, and then press <F6>.

## **Load Optimized Defaults Option**

This option opens a dialog box that lets you install optimized defaults for all appropriate items in the Setup Utility. Press <Y> and then <Enter> to install the defaults. Press <N> and then <Enter> to not install the defaults. The optimized defaults place demands on the system that may be greater than the performance level of the components, such as the CPU and the memory. You can cause fatal errors or instability if you install the optimized defaults when your hardware does not support them. If you only want to install setup defaults for a specific option, select and display that option, and then press <F7>.

## **Set Supervisor and User Passwords Options**

These items can be used to install a password. A Supervisor password takes precedence over a User password, and the Supervisor can limit the activities of a User. To install a password, follow these steps:

- 1. Highlight the item Set Supervisor/User Password on the main menu and press <Enter>.
- 2. The password dialog box appears.

#### **Enter Password:**

3. If you are installing a new password, type in the password. You cannot use more than eight characters or numbers. The Set Supervisor/User Password item differentiates between upper and lower characters. Press <Enter> after you have typed in the password. If you are deleting a password that is already installed, press <Enter> when the password dialog box appears. You see a message that indicates that the password has been disabled.

# PASSWORD DISABLED !!! Press any key to continue . . .

Press any key. You are prompted to confirm the password:

#### **Confirm Password:**

- Type the password again and press <Enter>, or press <Enter> if you are deleting a password that is already installed.
- 6. If you typed the password correctly, the password will be installed.

## **Save & Exit Setup Option**

Highlight this item and press <Enter> to save the changes that you have made in the Setup Utility and exit the Setup Utility. When the Save and Exit dialog box appears, press <Y> to save and exit, or press <N> to return to the main menu:

## **Exit Without Saving**

Highlight this item and press <Enter> to discard any changes that you have made in the Setup Utility and exit the Setup Utility. When the Exit Without Saving dialog box appears, press <Y> to discard changes and exit, or press <N> to return to the main menu.

**Note:** If you have made settings that you do not want to save, use the "Exit Without Saving" item and press <Y> to discard any changes you have made.

# **Using the Mainboard Software**

# **About the Software CD-ROM**

The support software CD-ROM that is included in the mainboard package contains all the drivers and utility programs needed to properly run the bundled products. Below you can find a brief description of each software program, and the location for your mainboard version. More information on some programs is available in a README file and PATH.DOC file, located in the same directory as the software.

**Note:** Do not install software from a folder that is not specified for use with your mainboard.

Before installing any software, always inspect the folder for files named README.TXT, PATH.DOC, or something similar. These files may contain important information that is not included in this manual.

# **Drivers Installation**

### **Audio Drivers and Software**

Most of the sub-folders in this folder are empty, with a short README file giving directions to alternate folders for the appropriate software.

#### Installation for Windows 2000/98/98SE/ME/95

To install the audio drivers, go to the directory \INTEL\realtek-codec\; then run SETUP.EXE

#### **Installation for Windows NT4.0**

- 1. Click Start.
- 2. Click Settings and then click Control Panel.
- 3. Double-click the Multimedia icon.
- 4. Select the Device tab.
- 5. Click Add.
- 6. Select the item "Unlisted or Updated Driver" in the List of Drivers in the list box and then specify the path to the PCI audio NT drivers \INTEL\realtek-codec\NT4).
- 7. Select "Avance Logic, Inc. AC'97" and click OK.
- 8. Choose the proper I/O or click OK for the default setting. Setup installs the drivers and software.
- 9. Restart the Windows NT system when prompted.

### **IDE Drivers**

This folder has software and drivers for the IDE that is integrated on this mainboard. Drivers are provided for Windows 2000/98/98SE/ME/95 and Windows NT.

#### Installation for Windows 2000/98/98SE/ME/95/NT

To install the IDE drivers, go to the directory \INTEL\IDE\; then run SETUP.EXE to install the INF driver for your operating system.

## **INF Drivers**

This folder has software and drivers for the INF that is integrated on this mainboard. Drivers are provided for Windows 2000/98/98SE/ME/95 and Windows NT.

#### Installation for Windows 2000/98/98SE/ME/95/NT

To install the INF drivers, go to the directory \INTEL\INST\; then run SETUP.EXE to install the INF driver for your operating system.

# **Utility Software Reference**

All the utility software available from this page is Windows compliant. It is provided only for the convenience of customers. The following software is furnished under license and may only be used or copied in accordance with the terms of the license.

**Note:** The software in these folders is subject to change at anytime without prior notice. Please refer to the support CD for available software.

#### **Award Flash Memory Utility**

This utility lets you erase the system BIOS stored on a Flash Memory chip on the mainboard, and lets you copy an updated version of the BIOS to the chip. Proceed with caution when using this program. If you erase the current BIOS and fail to write a new BIOS, or write a new BIOS that is incorrect, your system will malfunction. Refer to Chapter 3, *Using BIOS* for more information.

#### **PC-CILLIN**

The PC-CILLIN software program provides anti-virus protection for your system. This program is available for Windows 2000/ME/98SE and Windows NT. Check the readme.txt and install the appropriate anti-virus software for your operating system.

We strongly recommend users to install this free anti-virus software to help protect your system against viruses.

**Note:** Update your virus software regularly to protect against new viruses.

#### **CD Ghost**

The CD Ghost software enables you to create a virtual cabinet of CD-ROM drives on your system to help you categorize and organize your CD collection. A user-friendly interface assists you in quickly creating images of both CDs and DVDs onto your system. To install the software, run SETUP.EXE from the following directory:

#### **Recovery Genius**

The Recovery Genius software program is an innovative windows application system that protects your hard disk drive from virus intrusion, accidental deletions and from system corruption. To install the Recovery Genius software program run SETUP.EXE from the following directory:

#### Language Genius

The Language Genius is a software–based product that helps you to learn new languages. To install the Language Genius software program run SETUP.EXE from the following directory:

#### **PageABC**

The PageABC application software enables you to create your own home page. To install the PageABC, go to the directory \UTILITYPageABC, and then run SETUP.EXE to install the application software.

**Jumper 1** – enables you to clear the BIOS:

- 1. Turn the system off.
- 2. Short pins 2 and 3 on JP1.
- 3. Return the jumper to the normal setting.
- 4. Turn the system on. The BIOS is returned to the default settings.

**Jumper 2** – enable this jumper if you want keyboard activity to awaken the system from power saving mode.

**Jumper 3** – enables you to prevent the BIOS from being updated (flashed). Set the jumper to unlock to update your BIOS. After updating the BIOS, change it to the locked setting. For instructions on updating the BIOS refer to Chapter 3, "Updating the BIOS."

## **The Panel Connector**

The panel connector provides a standard set of switch and LED connectors usually found on ATX or micro-ATX cases. Refer to the table below for information:
