

The M81E/M81DC2/M812-FX series motherboard offers the high integration, high performance, high compatibility and power efficient solution on the powerful Intel PPGA370 processors. The motherboard uses the Intel i810E chipset which includes the FW82810/DC100/E (GMCHO/GMCH/GMCHE) / FW82801AA (ICH) and N82802AB (Firmware Hub) chip in the Flex ATX form factor.

The principal feature of this motherboard is it can support PPGA370 Celeron and Coppermine series processors. It operate at 66/100/133MHz FSB and CPU speed running from 300MHz up to 733MHz.

The i810E chipset provides full AGP capability with the internal 2D/3D graphics engine for maximum software compatibility, also supports full MPEG-2 motion compensation for software-assisted DVD video playback and a digital video output that may support (via Chrontel CH7008A external video Encoder) NTSC and PAL broadcast standards.

The motherboard provides a Mini PCI interface that was developed specifically for integrated communications peripherals such as modems and network interface card. For customers who need the flexibility of LAN and modem solutions that can be changed and upgraded by the end user, PC card may offer a better fitting solution. Also integrated AC97 Audio and 10/ 100 Mbps Fast Ethernet LAN solution, which can be configured for either 100Mbps (100Base-TX) or 10Mbps (10Base-T) Ethernet operation. It provides a RJ-45 port for user to attach the motherboard, and a phone jack to attach the chassis for modem.

The system management chip (Winbond W83627HF-AW) with software, allows user to monitor system environment such as system and CPU fan speed (requires fan with tachometer output), CPU temperature , system temperature and operating voltages.

The motherboard has a comprehensive set of integrated I/O ports. 

5. Hardware Installation

5.1 Before You Begin

The M81E/M81DC2/M812-FX series motherboard is designed to fit into a special Flex ATX form factor chassis. The pattern of the mounting holes and the position of back panel I/O ports is designed with a special Flex ATX specification. The chassis may come with various mounting fasteners which are made of metal or plastic. It is highly recommended to use as many metal fasteners as possible to mount the motherboard in the chassis for better grounding.

5.2 Caution Static Electricity

Before removing the motherboard from its anti-static bag, you need to eliminate any static electricity that may be accumulated on your body by touching a grounded or anti-static surface. If noting is available, touch the housing of power supply which is plugged into the AC outlet.

After removing the motherboard from its anti-static bag, place it only on a grounded or anti-static surface, component side up. Inspect the motherboard and contact you retailer immediately if it is damaged.

5.3 Pre Installation Procedure


Before you install your motherboard into a chassis, its convenient to install the CPU, memory modules and set all the jumpers to correct settings. The examples and explain below shown the function and identify of the jumper setting to help you understand the circuits and enable or disable certain features or properties of the motherboard.

Step1: Jumper Settings Explain

- Battery "BAT1"
 - It is a coin-cell style Lithium CR2032 battery is used to provide power to the RTC and CMOS RAM for keep the data inviolate and effective. The RTC is a real time clock device, which provides the date and time to system. The CMOS RAM is used for keeping the information of system configuration, so the system can automatically boot O/S every time.
 - The battery has a 3~5 years life if the system is not power up. When the system power up, the power for the RTC and CMOS RAM is supplied from the 3.3V power supply to extend the life of battery. The user can change a

new battery to replace old one after it cannot work or BIOS does not keep its settings.








• Power Connector "ATX1"

- CPU FAN Connector "J2"
 - This is a 3-Pin connector that support cooling fan of 12 VDC/0.5A or less, when the system goes into sleep state, fan should be shut down to eliminate audible noise and reduce power consumption. RJ-45 Port "USB1 & LAN"

- It is a 8-Pin RJ-45 port for you to connect to either Ethernet 10Base-T or 100Base-TX network. The motherboard provides an RJ-45 port to connect Twisted Pair Ethernet(TPE) cable to Hub, orient the connector so the key is aligned with the port, then push the connector into port until you hear a click voice.
- The RJ-45 port has two LED indicators which indicate the presence of station Link and Activity status for installation verification and diagnostic purpose.



• Link LED(Yellow): The Link LED is located on the left part of the port. It is associated with the RJ-45 phone jack to indicate whether the twisted pair link connected. When there is no coming network data packet on the jack, the jack will start to detect periodical link-integrity pulses which should be sent by the device connected at the other end of the link, on the received pair of the twisted-pair cable. If link-integrity pulse is not detected, there is a link failure and the Link LED will be turned off and the transmit and receive functions of the jack will also be disabled. Table shows all the status of the Link LED, it is useful as a trouble-shooting aid. Match the activity of LED on the port with one of the status indicated in the table.





- Mini PCI Socket "U2"
 - The Mini PCI is a standard for integrated peripherals, with emphasis on communications. Mini PCI defines a small card that is functionally equivalent to a standard PCI expansion card. It was developed specifically for integrated communications peripherals such as modems and network interface card (NICs). The Mini PCI card maintains the essential electronics, functionality. PC signals and software drivers of standard PCI expansion cards.

The motherboard build a Mini PCI of Type ${\rm III}$ is designed to provide the smallest form factor.

 It allows for smaller size and placement flexibility, particularly in terms of height or thickness of the integrated peripheral. You can use the Mini PCI socket to install modem interface card that add new feature to your system.






Step2: Install the PPGA370 Processor

- The M81E/M81DC2/M812-FX series motherboard supports a wide range of Intel PPGA370 processor include the Celeron and the Coppermine (FC-PGA). It operate over 66/100/133MHz FSB.
- This motherboard provides a PGA370 socket (370-Pin Zero Insertion Force ZIF socket) which a FC-PGA (Flip Chip Pin Grid Array)) or PPGA (Plastic Pin Grid Array) package plugs into.
 - FC-PGA : The package technology used on Coppermine -256K processors for the PGA370 socket.
 - PPGA : The package technology used for Intel Celeron-128K processors which utilize the PGA370 socket.
- Follow the steps mentioned below to install the PPGA370 processor :
 - On the motherboard, locate Pin-1 on the processor and PGA370 socket, then open the locking lever for processor.






- Orient the processor and insert vertically on to the socket until the processor clip into place.
- Turn the swivel to locking position and hook it under the latch on the side of the socket to lock it in place.
- Orient the cooling fan and heat sink then insert firmly.




• Locate the power connector J2 for the processor cooling fan, then connect the cable from cooling fan to J2.



Step3: Install the SDRAM Modules

- The motherboard has two DIMM (Dual In-line Memory Module) sockets which support SDRAM modules installed with 3.3V, unbuffered, PC-100 (100MHz) SDRAM memory chips. Each memory module can support a maximum capacity of 128MB so total maximum memory is 256MB.
- Follow the steps mentioned below to install the SDRAM module :
 - On the motherboard, locate DIMM sockets.
 - Pull the locking latches of the DIMM sockets outwards.
 - Align the memory module correctly. The edge connector of the memory module has notches that match obstructions in the DIMM socket. You must match the notches with the obstructions in order to install the module.
 - Press the edge connector of the memory module into the DIMM socket.
 Press down quite firmly so that the locking latches of the DIMM socket are levered upwards to secure the memory module in place.
 - Repeat the process with any other memory modules that you want to install.





5.4 Install the motherboard in a chassis

After you have prepared the motherboard by installing a processor, one or more memory modules and have set the jumpers correctly, install the motherboard into a chassis and begin connecting essential peripheral items to the connectors on the motherboard.


Follow the instructions given with the chassis to install the motherboard into the mounting brackets inside the chassis. The motherboard has several holes drilled through it and you should be able to drive a screw through some of these holes into the mounting brackets in the chassis. Don't overtighten the screws as this can stress the motherboard. Note: Make sure that the power supply unit in the chassis is not connected to a power outlet while you are carrying out the installation procedure.

We will begin the installation of the motherboard. Please follow the procedure step by step which designed to guide you to a complete and correct installation.

Step1: Install the IDE Device

- The motherboard has two IDE channel ports, the Primary IDE channel and Secondary IDE channel. Each IDE channel can support two IDE devices. IDE devices include hard disk drives, and slim type CD-ROM drives.
 Typically, most people install one IDE hard disk drive and one IDE slim type CD-ROM drive so this motherboard ships with one IDE cable. You can easily obtain a second IDE cable if you want to install more than two IDE devices.
- Follow the steps mentioned below to install the IDE device :
 - Locate the IDE1 and IDE2 box header on the motherboard.
 - IDE1-Connect one end of the 40-Pin ribbon cable that comes with the drive to the HDD header, and the other end of the cable to the IDE1 box header on the motherboard.

 IDE2-Connect one end of the 40-Pin ribbon cable that comes with the drive to the slim type CD-ROM header, and the other end of the cable to the IDE2 box header on the motherboard. (Note : Each header has the Pin-1 side clearly marked. The Pin-1 side of the each ribbon cable is always marked with a red stripe on the cable.)



 The primary channel has priority to the secondary channel. Within each channel, the two different devices are distinguished by master and slave relationship. The master device has priority over the slave device. (Refer to illustration on the below)




This motherboard connects to the front panel I/O are located on jumper block FSP1. Follow the instruction carefully for proper connections to your front panel display and control. This section explains how to connect these components.

- PW-SW : It is a 2-Pin header connects to the chassis-mounted power button.
- **RST-SW** : It is a 2-Pin header connects to the chassis-mounted reset switch and is used to reboot the system.
- HD-LED : It is a 2-Pin header connects to the chassis-mounted HDD LED to indicate HDD activity.
- SPEAKER : It is a 4-Pin header connects to the chassis-mounted speaker. When system has any abnormally state that you will hear warnings through speaker.(If you have a speaker on the chassis that we recommend not to use them because it will have buzzer noise when the system is booted.)

- **KB-LK** : It is a 2-Pin header connects to the chassis-mounted key lock switch that is used to lock the keyboard for security purpose.



Step3: ATX1 / HDD / CD-ROM Power Connection





- USB1 & LAN (Black 8-Pin LAN Port) allows you to connect to a Local Area Network(LAN) through a network hub.
- USB1 & LAN (Black two 4-Pin USB Ports) is available for connecting USB devices.
- LPT1 (Burgundy 25-Pin Parallel Port) can be used by printers or other parallel communication devices.
- **COM1** (Teal/Turquoise 9-Pin Serial Port) is ready for a mouse or other serial devices.
- VGA1 (Blue 15-Pin VGA Display Port) is for output to a VGA compatible devices.
- **S_Terminal** (Black 4-Pin S Signal Out Port) can be used this port send the video output of the system to a S terminal port on TV set.
- **AV_Terminal** (Yellow 2-Pin AV Signal Out Port) can be used this port send the video output of the system to a AV terminal port on TV set.



This chapter is a step by step guide that explains how to use your M81E/M81DC2/ M812-FX series motherboard to build a powerful system. At a minimum, you will need the following components in order to build a fully function system.

- After hardware configuration of motherboard is completed and system hardware has been assembled. Refer to combination as follows.
- You are now ready to boot the system for the first time. Please continue to the next section to configure your BIOS (Basic Input Output System) setting. It must be configured after booting.

6. BIOS Configuration

The motherboard provides a 4MB, 3.3V, 32-Pin PLCC package Firmware Hub chips that can be updated using provided BIOS Utility. The Setup Utility stores data about motherboard components and the configuration of devices that are connected to it. The information is used to test and initialize components at start up time and to make sure everything runs properly when the system is operating. The Utility provide you the opportunity whenever you need to install your motherboard, change its default value for better performance or reconfigure your system when new components or device are used. We will suggest updating your BIOS if you have problems with your motherboard and you know that the new BIOS revision will solve your problems. Unnecessary updating may result more problems for your motherboard.

When you start up the system, the system provides the opportunity to run this program. This appears during the Power On Self Test (POST), press <DELETE> key to call up "Setup Utility". If you are a little bit late pressing the mentioned key(s), POST will continue with its test routines. If you still need to call setup, restart the system by pressing <Ctrl> + <Alt> + <Delete> keys, or press the reset button on your chassis.

You can also restart by turning system off and then back on again. But do it only first 2 way fail. The below table, CMOS Setup Utility will appear on screen after call up.

When you start setup, the main menu appears. The main menu of the setup Utility shows a list of the options that are available. A highlight shows which option is currently selected. Press <Enter> key to automatically detect an IDE hard disk drive. If automatic detection is successful, the correct values will be filled in the remaining fields on this screen. Displayed up are explanation of the Maxtor Diamond 5.7GB HDD.

- If automatic detection fails, your hard disk drive may be to older too, now. You can try updating your BIOS or enter the correct parameters manually. This feature allows you to set the various system options of your choice, including virus warning, external cache, security option and boot operations. To access the Advanced BIOS Features screen, highlight this option on the main menu screen and press <Enter> key.

6.2.1 Virus Warning

If this item is enabled, it provides some protection which try to write to the boot sector and partition table of your hard disk drive. We recommend that you enabled virus warning as soon as you have installed your disk with an OS. When enabled a warning message is displayed and a beep sound is produced whenever an attempt is made to write on the hard disk's boot sector.

This setting allow you to enabled the USB ports that are integrated on the motherboard. And if you are using a keyboard connected through the USB port. The available options for USB Controller are : [Enabled] [Disabled].

6.4.3 Init Display First

This item to define if your graphics adapter is installed in one of the PCI slots or select Onboard if you have a graphics system integrated on the motherboard. The available options for Init Display First are : [Onboard] [PCI Slot].

These items allows you to decide to Enabled or Disabled the i810 chips family to support AC97 Audio and Modem. We recommend that you set these items to enabled when you use an AMR card.

KB Power ON Password Hot Key Power ON The POWER ON Function item allows you to power on the system by pressing hot keys or typing a password. Refer to explain in the below.

- [Password] : Disable the function of power button and let the system can only be powered on through the preset keys (like a password).

The UART2 Mode Setting depends on which type of infrared module is used in the system. When set to "ASKIR" or "IrDA", the UART2 is used to support the infrared module connected on the motherboard. 

The Frequency Control allows you to set the CPU and system bus clock for your system, also system clock frequency will automatically be modulated which help reducing electromagnetic interference.

• Or allows your O/S specify the path for LAN driver install, please refer to "LAN Driver Readme" explain on the Figure 2.

BIOS Utility

This utility lets you erase the system BIOS stored on a Flash Memory chip on the motherboard, and let you copy an updated BIOS to the chip. Take care how you use this program. If you erase the current BIOS and fail to write a new BIOS, or write a new BIOS that is incorrect, your system will malfunction.

The flash memory utility is called **AWDFLASH.EXE**. To use the utility, you must be in real-mode DOS (not the DOS box that is available in Windows 95/98/NT). If you are using Windows 95/98, shut down your system and select the option restart in DOS in the shut down dialog box. If you are running Windows NT, shut down your system and boot from a DOS diskette temporarily in order to run the flash memory utility. You can easily flash a BIOS by following the step below :

- After downloading the appropriate BIOS file from website, extract it to a bootable DOS 6.X or Windows 98 diskette.
 - If you are using DOS 6.X, reboot your system with the bootable diskette in the A: drive. To make sure a clean DOS environment is loaded, press the [F5] key while "Starting MS-DOS" is displayed. After the system has rebooted, the cursor will appear at the A:\>prompt.
 - If you are using Windows 95 or 98, press [F8] key when you see "Starting MS Windows 95 or 98". Select the option "Safe Mode Command Prompt only".
- Now you can run the flash utility from the A:\prompt.For example, to update the motherboard to BIOS version xx, you would type :

A:\>AWDFLASH xxxxxx.BIN

- Then press [Enter] key, after the flash screen appear, select [Y] to save the current BIOS or [N] if you do not want to save the current BIOS. We recommended that you save the current BIOS.
- When prompted, select [Yes] to program the BIOS.
- After the update process has completed, you will be prompted to power off or reset your system. Once the system reboots, verify that the new BIOS version appear on the screen.

Note : After reprogramming the BIOS, you may need to enter BOS setup and reset your settings.
